CLERK: I do, Mr. President. I have a series of hearing notices from the Natural Resources Committee signed by Senator Langemeier, as Chair of the committee. I have a reference report referring gubernatorial appointees to a standing committee for confirmation hearing. And amendments to be printed: amendment to LB650 by Senator Christensen; and Senator Avery, an amendment to LB722. That's all that I have, Mr. President. (Legislative Journal pages 473-474.) PRESIDENT SHEEHY: Thank you, Mr. Clerk. We will move to the first item under General File, LB867. [LB867]

CLERK: LB867 is a bill by Senator Karpisek. (Read title.) Introduced on January 11 of this year. At that time referred to the General Affairs Committee, advanced to General File. There are General Affairs Committee amendments, Mr. President. (AM1638, Legislative Journal page 399.) [LB867]

PRESIDENT SHEEHY: Thank you, Mr. Clerk. Senator Karpisek, would you like to give us a summary on LB867 and AM1638? [LB867]

SENATOR KARPISEK: Thank you, Mr. President, I would. LB867 amends Section 53-124 of the Liquor Control Act by increasing shipping fees from \$200 to \$1,000. Currently, there are 613 shippers with either a Class S shipping license, such as wine and spirits, or a Class D shipping license which is beer. There are 504 wine and spirits shipping licenses and 109 beer shipping licenses. Other states have shipping licenses that range all over the board. At \$200, we are among the lowest. At \$1,000, we would be nearing the top. No one testified against the bill in the hearing and it was voted out of

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committee with unanimous support. Currently, the state collects \$122,600 in shipping license fees. LB867 would increase that amount by \$490,400, to a total of \$613,000. The committee amendment clarifies that the shipping license fees would go to the General Fund. The fees have been going to the General Fund, but the State Auditor, in a recent audit of the Liquor Control Commission, recommended that the commission seek an Attorney General's Opinion as to where the shipping license fees should go. The Attorney General's Opinion stated the shipping license fees should go to the school fund. Since the fees have been going to the General Fund, the committee felt that an amendment was needed to clarify that the shipping license fees are to continue to go to the General Fund. In 1992, a cleanup bill changed the word "permits" to "licenses" in the statute. That's why the change was made...or it could go to the school fund, but that's why it has always been going to the General Fund. When it was changed from permits to licenses, the change in where it went was not made. I do feel that this should go to the General Fund. I think it will have a better impact on the state rather than going to the school's fund. Thank you, Mr. President. [LB867]

PRESIDENT SHEEHY: Thank you, Senator Karpisek. Members requesting to speak on AM1638 to LB867, Senator Wightman, you're recognized. [LB867]

SENATOR WIGHTMAN: Thank you, Mr. President and members of the body. If Senator Karpisek would yield to a question? [LB867]

PRESIDENT SHEEHY: Senator Karpisek, would you yield to Senator Wightman? [LB867]

SENATOR KARPISEK: Yes, I would. [LB867]

SENATOR WIGHTMAN: Senator Karpisek, do you see the number of out-of-state licensees going down if we increase the fees fivefold? [LB867]

SENATOR KARPISEK: I think that we could say that some would go down. I can't say how many but a few might go down. But we may pick a few up as some of the craft breweries or things like Boulevard and that are coming into the state. So we may lose a few. We didn't hear any testimony like that in committee, but I think it would be fair to say that we might lose some. [LB867]

SENATOR WIGHTMAN: I do support the bill. I think we ought to applaud Senator Karpisek's offers, or what he's done here, and the members of the General Affairs Committee. It looks like they've kicked over a rock and found \$490,000. If all of us could do that we'd have about \$24 million addition to the General Fund. And it seems like we are really bringing ourselves into line with other states. So I do intend to support both the committee amendment and the bill itself. Thank you, Mr. President. [LB867]

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PRESIDENT SHEEHY: Thank you, Senator Wightman. Seeing no additional requests to speak, Senator Karpisek, you're recognized to close on your General Affairs Committee amendment, AM1638. Senator Karpisek waives closing. The question before the body is on the adoption of AM1638 to LB867. All those in favor vote yea; opposed, nay. Please record, Mr. Clerk. [LB867]

SENATOR KARPISEK: Thank you, Mr. President and members of the body. I would like to thank everyone who has looked at this, thought about this. And as I did tell Senator Carlson yesterday, I have an idea where I'd like some of this money to go. Obviously, that's a different bill and we'll see where that goes. I also would like to thank Senator Howard who came forward with a lot of these ideas, and we've worked together very well on those this year. And also the Liquor Control Commission for coming forward and working with us and trying to find ways, as Senator Wightman said, to get in line and maybe kick over a rock. I don't think this is going to hurt the industry. I don't think it'll raise prices. If I thought that, I would not do it. I think it is a way to get in line; hopefully, find some money for some other projects we may have. Or if that's not possible, at least to put a little more money in the General Fund. Thank you, Mr. President. [LB867]

PRESIDENT SHEEHY: Thank you, Senator Karpisek. You have heard the closing. The question before the body is on the advancement of LB867. All those in favor vote yea; opposed, nay. Please record, Mr. Clerk. [LB867]

CLERK: 31 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on the advancement of the bill. [LB867]

PRESIDENT SHEEHY: LB867 advances. We will now proceed to LB848. [LB867 LB848]

CLERK: LB848, a bill by Senator Cornett. (Read title.) Introduced on January 11 of this year. At that time referred to the Urban Affairs Committee. The bill was advanced to General File. There are committee amendments, Mr. President. (AM1646, Legislative Journal page 401.) [LB848]

PRESIDENT SHEEHY: Thank you, Mr. Clerk. Senator Cornett, you're recognized to open on LB848. [LB848]

SENATOR CORNETT: Thank you, Lieutenant Governor and members of the body.

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LB848 deals with provisions relating to the board of equalization in statute 16-707, requiring when the board of equalization, a city of the first class meets, to be consistent with those of a metropolitan and second-class city. The current language requires cities of the first class to meet on the first Monday in the month of June, whereas metropolitan and second-class cities are not statutorily required to meet on any specific date. The change in 16-707 allows the board of equalization to only meet when deemed necessary due to business requiring public discussion. This change is being added for a simple reason: the lack of business presented to the board at the time of the required meeting. For example, the bulk of business referred to the city of Bellevue's board of equalization predominantly deals with mowing of weeds and cleaning of properties. Most of this cleaning occurs during the summer and early fall months after the required meeting date in June. The Urban Affairs Committee has an amendment and I urge you to support the amendment and the underlying bill. Thank you. [LB848]

PRESIDENT SHEEHY: Thank you, Senator Cornett. You have heard the opening to LB848. As stated, there is an Urban Affairs Committee amendment. Senator McGill, you're recognized to open on AM1646. [LB848]

SENATOR McGILL: Thank you, Mr. President and members of the body. The amendment is just a small tweak that we felt was appropriate, that we didn't need to limit to a certain time in June. That we could leave it open to them to decide on their own. And that really is the crux of this very small amendment. Thank you. [LB848]

The question before the body is on the advancement of LB848. All those in favor vote yea; opposed, nay. Please record, Mr. Clerk. [LB848]

CLERK: 28 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on the advancement of LB848. [LB848]

PRESIDENT SHEEHY: LB848 advances. We'll now proceed to LB746. [LB848 LB746]

CLERK: LB746, a bill originally introduced by Senator Giese. (Read title.) The bill was introduced on January 6 of this year and referred to the Judiciary Committee. The bill

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was advanced to General File. There are Judiciary Committee amendments pending. (AM1669, Legislative Journal page 401.) [LB746]

PRESIDENT SHEEHY: Thank you, Mr. Clerk. Senator Giese, you're recognized to open on LB746. [LB746]

SENATOR GIESE: Thank you, Mr. President and members of the body. I rise in support of LB746 which would extend and enhance the provisions of Nebraska's existing ban on racial profiling. The current ban was first passed in 2001, and one of its primary components was the requirement that law enforcement agencies collect data that could be used to assess the prevalence of racial profiling relative to motor vehicle stops. This data is submitted to the Crime Commission on a quarterly basis, who in turn produces an annual report on traffic stops and allegations of racial profiling for the Governor and members of the Legislature. As it stands now, the reporting requirements for law enforcement agencies expired on January 1, and the requirements for the Crime Commission will expire on April 1. These requirements have previously been extended by the Legislature in both 2004 and 2006. Failure to extend these reporting deadlines would result in the termination of the annual traffic stop report produced by the Crime Commission. LB746 would also expand both the membership and role of the Racial Profiling Advisory Committee which is tasked with advising the Crime Commission on the production of the annual traffic stop reports. Currently, the committee consists of the executive director of the Crime Commission, representatives of a number of statewide law enforcement groups, and the ACLU. The green copy of the bill would add three additional members to the committee: the executive director of the Commission on Mexican-Americans or his or her designee, the executive director of the Commission on Indian Affairs or his or her designee, and a representative appointed by the Nebraska branches of the NAACP. A Judiciary Committee amendment to follow would add a fourth new member representing the Minority Justice Committee which is a joint project of the Supreme Court and Nebraska State Bar Association. Including these new members will not only bring new voices to the table, but will increase the committee's ability to reflect the concerns of those groups most affected by racial profiling. LB746 would also move the role of the Racial Profiling Committee beyond simply reviewing the traffic stop reports and allow the committee to make recommendations to the Crime Commission and the Legislature on how to better implement and improve upon the existing ban on racial profiling. A mere review of the data does nothing to address the issue of racial profiling, whether such profiling is real or just perceived. As many Nebraska communities have learned through their experience, bringing new law enforcement and the affected communities together can be essential in creating the type of broadbased solutions that can best address the difficult racial issues we face on a daily basis. The Racial Profiling Advisory Committee is in the unique position to help facilitate such solutions, and giving them the authority to make recommendations based on their continuing review of the data is an important next step. When Nebraska first passed its ban on racial profiling, the legislation was a collaboration of law enforcement

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and advocacy groups seeking to find a common solution to a growing concern. As our communities become more diverse, it is important to have an existing structure that mirrors our diversity and works with law enforcement to ensure that all Nebraskans are treated in a just and fair manner. LB746 would maintain the existing structure that has served our state well since its inception, and I would urge the body to advance the bill to Select File. [LB746]

PRESIDENT SHEEHY: Thank you, Senator Giese. You have heard the opening to LB746. As was stated, there is a Judiciary Committee amendment, AM1669. Senator Ashford, you're recognized to open. [LB746]

SENATOR ASHFORD: Thank you, Mr. Lieutenant Governor. Senator Giese has accurately described the bill and actually the committee amendments. The committee amendments, as Senator Giese indicated, adds four new individuals to the committee and those were mentioned by Senator Giese. It changes the number of times the committee is required to meet from quarterly to semiannually, and it would provide that the Racial Profiling Advisory Committee may provide analysis of the review of the racial profiling data collected and make policy recommendations to the Nebraska Commission on Law Enforcement and Criminal Justice. This is important legislation in many ways. One, it brings to this body, again, the issue that we're facing in many areas, and that is not having accurate data to make informed policy decisions. In the area of racial profiling, in the area of...one of the areas I'm concerned about, truancy, other areas where we need to make policy where the perception is that there are issues out there in the communities throughout our state that need to be addressed. But oftentimes because we don't have adequate information, we don't have the outcomes that we need or the information on outcomes that we expect when we pass legislation. Oftentimes we're making policy in a vacuum. Senator Giese has come up with a solution to one of those areas, the area of racial profiling, and I commend him for doing that. With that, Mr. Lieutenant Governor, I would urge that the body adopt AM1669 and advance LB746. [LB746]

PRESIDENT SHEEHY: Thank you, Senator Ashford. You've heard the opening of the Judiciary Committee amendment, AM1669. Members requesting to speak, Senator Coash, followed by Senator Fulton. Senator Coash, you're recognized. [LB746]

SENATOR COASH: Thank you, Mr. President, members of the body. We heard this in Judiciary last week. Senator Giese, Senator Ashford did a nice job of illustrating what this bill does, but I would like to ask, for the record, a few questions of Senator Giese if he would yield. [LB746]

PRESIDENT SHEEHY: Senator Giese, would you yield to Senator Coash? [LB746]

SENATOR GIESE: Yes. [LB746]

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SENATOR COASH: Senator Giese, thank you. How many members are we adding total to the racial profiling board including the committee amendment? [LB746]

SENATOR GIESE: This is three new members. [LB746]

SENATOR COASH: Three new members? [LB746]

SENATOR GIESE: I'm sorry, four new members. [LB746]

SENATOR COASH: Four. Three new members was your idea and then we added one

more in our committee amendment. [LB746]

SENATOR GIESE: Right. [LB746]

SENATOR COASH: Are any of these members paid to be on this board or do they receive any kind of stipend in order to serve? [LB746]

SENATOR GIESE: They are not paid members of the committee. [LB746]

SENATOR COASH: Okay. Are these members who...we were pretty prescriptive about who they were, so we know who we want on the board. Thank you, Senator Giese. Members, we got a lot of boards in this state and I've been asking some of the senior members around how many, and the answer that I've been getting is a lot, too many. And here we are with LB746 not adding a board but adding members to a board. Now, Senator Giese has done a nice job of saying: Look, it's not going to cost us any extra money. But I do think this is something that we ought to be aware of, members. We continue to hear from our constituents: Government is getting big. What are we doing? And it seems like you can't have anything in this state without a board to oversee it. This board that we're talking about in LB746 serves a purpose. I was supportive of the additions through the committee. But I wanted to use this opportunity to say, we better take a look at these and we better continue to be very selective about when we decide we need a new board, when we decide we need new members to a board, and we better start to decide if the board still served the purpose now as when they were first implemented. Thank you, Mr. President. [LB746]

PRESIDENT SHEEHY: Thank you, Senator Coash. Senator Fulton, you're recognized. [LB746]

SENATOR FULTON: Thank you, Mr. President. Would Senator Giese yield to a question please? [LB746]

PRESIDENT SHEEHY: Senator Giese, would you yield to Senator Fulton? [LB746]

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SENATOR GIESE: Yes. [LB746]

SENATOR FULTON: Thank you, Senator Giese. I want to be clear that I support this. I want to take this opportunity to ask questions about what has been found. So in the green copy, this is a board that's existed since January 1, 2002, and was to have terminated on April 1, 2010. We will be effectively extending the time that this board can be operative, and then giving the board additional powers as I understand it. What has been found? We've been collecting information, just raw data, since 2002, so almost eight years. What has been found thus far? [LB746]

SENATOR GIESE: Senator Fulton, if I could just back up a little bit. The board, the advisory committee is not set to expire; it's the data collection that is set to expire. And I can't give you exact numbers, that's one of the problems that we have, Senator Fulton. We have numbers that are turned in regularly, and there's a report. If you had not seen that, I'll make you aware of that. We don't have any specifics. If there are specific issues that need to be addressed, they are on that level with whether...whatever department that may be with, city, if you will. But that's just...we want to keep that, this committee, advisory committee, going to address these issues. We're doing it now and I think it's a great bill and I would just hope that...and thank you for supporting the bill. [LB746]

SENATOR FULTON: Thank you, Senator Giese. I've been in this place now for four years and I have seen how we have created things which tend to get forgotten about and this is an important issue. I mean, the gathering of data with regard to...if someone is being pulled over simply because of their appearance, that's wrong. And so we need to collect data to determine whether indeed that's occurring. And so I always have concern when I see a sunset date that passes and we have to come back and extend it because it means that the original intention which put this forward wasn't met. And so I stand corrected and I thank you for that, Senator Giese. This does not eliminate the board or extend the board; it extends the ability to collect data. I just hope that those who are on this board and those who will be on the board in the future recognize that we need to collect the data and start making some decisions as to what the data says. I will stop there. Thank you, Mr. President. [LB746]

PRESIDENT SHEEHY: Thank you, Senator Fulton. Senator Harms, you're recognized. [LB746]

SENATOR HARMS: Thank you, Mr. President, colleagues. I rise in support of this amendment and LB746. Senator Giese, could you yield? [LB746]

PRESIDENT SHEEHY: Senator Giese, would you yield to Senator Harms? [LB746]

SENATOR GIESE: Yes. [LB746]

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SENATOR HARMS: Senator Giese, as you have looked at this information and have prepared your bill for this, is it your opinion that we actually are racial profiling? [LB746]

SENATOR GIESE: No, it is not. [LB746]

SENATOR HARMS: Does any of the data or statistics that we now collect walk us in that direction? [LB746]

SENATOR GIESE: I would say, Senator Harms, the overall picture, we are doing a great job and certainly does not point to that conclusion that we would be doing that. But this is just something that I think that it was a great bill when it was originally introduced and I think it's something that we just...the Crime Commission and the advisory committee that looks at this information uses that, hopefully, and addresses those issues if they do come up. [LB746]

SENATOR HARMS: So with adding these individuals to this process, what would we...what are we going to gain if we're...I mean, how are we going to deal with the data and the research? I mean, what changes would we make if we feel comfortable with the data? I happen to...the reason I'm asking this question, I'm not comfortable with the data at all to be frank with you. I think that there are issues and I think there are racial profiling that's taking place. I've talked with enough law enforcement people and other folks that feel that way. And I guess what I'm really asking here is that, what would we change so that we could get to the issue so that we can correct it? I don't think we can tolerate racial profiling. I don't think it's right. Just because I have different colored skin doesn't mean you ought to have the right to stop me. So I guess that's my question. [LB746]

SENATOR GIESE: Senator Harms, I would just respond by stating that the members that we are adding to the committee, the member of the NAACP, the Mexican-American Commission, the...and the other...I'll think of them in just a second, but the other ones that we're adding I think will bring more people to the...folks to the table that may be affected by this issue. And when they can look at those numbers and then they can hopefully make recommendations to us from those numbers. The problem right now, Senator, is we don't have...we get the data but we really can't...we don't have the resources to do a lot with the data. We've been approached by some groups that potentially could take a look at that for us as we look at these numbers. [LB746]

SENATOR HARMS: Well, Senator, does this bill...would this bill as it is written today with this amendment, is it going to actually provide the necessary resources to correct the issue? What I'm trying to get to is, yeah, I think there might be a problem and I'm trying to see what your thoughts are and what your vision might be, how we might correct this. [LB746]

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SENATOR GIESE: Well, no, it does not provide the resources to address these issues, but I think the one main underlying thing that it does is continue what we are doing now and by, as I said, adding these new members. We may get there some day, Senator Harms, but not financially... [LB746]

PRESIDENT SHEEHY: One minute. [LB746]

SENATOR GIESE: ...or with resources at this point. [LB746]

SENATOR HARMS: Thank you, Mr. President. Thank you, Senator Giese. [LB746]

PRESIDENT SHEEHY: Thank you, Senator Harms. Seeing no additional requests to speak, Senator Ashford, you're recognized to close on AM1669. [LB746]

SENATOR ASHFORD: Thank you. I don't have anything further. I would just urge the adoption of AM1669 and advancement of LB746. Thank you. [LB746]

SENATOR ROGERT PRESIDING

SENATOR ROGERT: Thank you, Senator Ashford. Members, you have heard the closing to AM1669, the committee amendment to LB746. The question before the body is, shall the amendment be adopted? All those in favor vote yea; opposed vote nay. Have all those voted who wish? Mr. Clerk, please record. [LB746]

CLERK: 26 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on the adoption of committee amendments. [LB746]

SENATOR ROGERT: AM1669 is adopted. Speaker Flood, you're recognized for an announcement. [LB746]

SPEAKER FLOOD: Thank you, Mr. President. Good morning, members. A couple of quick notes here. Remember that we'll start accepting requests for Speaker priority bills on February 8, that's next Tuesday. The deadline for all priority bill requests and designations is February 19, so we're in a very important window coming up here starting Tuesday, ending February 19. We are going to start at 10:00 a.m. on Tuesday as we usually do on the first day of the week. I would remind folks that that start time is still negotiable as we look at the rest of the week next week. We'll give you more guidance on that Tuesday. And the final thing I want to say is after we consider LB746, we are going to adjourn for the day today. Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR ROGERT: Thank you, Speaker Flood. Speaker Flood.

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SPEAKER FLOOD: I want to amend that. We are working Monday. We start at 10:00 a.m. Monday. (Laughter) I had a momentary lapse in my early age.

SENATOR ROGERT: You're excused, thank you, Speaker Flood.

SPEAKER FLOOD: I'm sure our more senior members will understand. Thank you. (Laughter)

SENATOR ROGERT: Returning to discussion on LB746. Seeing no members wishing to speak, Senator Giese, you're recognized to close on LB746. [LB746]

SENATOR GIESE: Thank you, Mr. President. I would just make one final note. Thank you for your support and Senator Coash and Fulton just...we have the Government Committee has acted and we do away with committees that do not meet and do not get work done and meet regularly and do those things. This committee is not one of those committees. They do meet and do get things done. So with that, I would urge your support and advancement of the bill. [LB746]

SENATOR ROGERT: Thank you, Senator Giese. Members, you have heard the closing to LB746. The question before the body, shall the bill advance to E&R Initial? All those in favor vote yea; opposed vote nay. Have all those voted who wish? Mr. Clerk, please record. [LB746]

CLERK: 29 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on the advancement of LB746. [LB746]

SENATOR ROGERT: LB746 does advance. Items for the record. [LB746]

CLERK: Mr. President, Natural Resources Committee reports LB689 to General File; LB764 to General File with amendments; and LB885 indefinitely postponed, those reports signed by Senator Langemeier as Chair.
