now enacted in 41 states. It's purpose . . . the language of the bill is in conformance with the uniform provisions of the other statutes. It is to expedite the handling of these kinds of transfers with greater security and less probability of error than what is currently possible.

PRESIDENT: Is there any further discussion? The question is, shall LB 190 be advanced to E & R initial. Record your vote. LB 183, excuse me. Record Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 30 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on motion to advance.

PRESIDENT: LB 183 is advanced to E & R initial. LB 190. Would you repeat that Senator Johnson.

SENATOR JOHNSON: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, I asked that LB 190 be held over.

PRESIDENT: Is there any objection to holding over LB 190? Seeing none, it is so ordered. LB 201.

CLERK: Read bill.

PRESIDENT: Senator Savage.

SENATOR SAVAGE: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, this is a traditional bill which has to be introduced each year to verify that the savings and loan associations operating in Nebraska and those chartered and regulated by the Federal Home Loan Bank, and those chartered by the Nebraska State Banking Department, have uniform wording in the statutes. It has to be introduced each year to bring the regulations up-to-date. I move that it be advanced to E & R initial.

PRESIDENT: Is there any further discussion? The question is, shall LB 201 be advanced to E & R initial. Record your vote. Record your vote please. Mr. Clerk, would you record.

CLERK: 29 ayes, no nays, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: LB 208. Oh, LB 201 is advanced to E & R initial. Alright, LB 208.

CLERK: Read bill.

PRESIDENT: Chair recognizes Senator Johnson.

CLERK: On 208. There are committee amendments Mr. President, by Senator Murphy's Banking Committee.

PRESIDENT: Chair recognizes Senator Murphy.

SENATOR MURPHY: I move the adoption of the committee amendments on 208.

PRESIDENT: You've heard the motion, is there any discussion or debate? The question is, shall the amendments to 208 . . . excuse me. Senator Barnett.

SENATOR BARNETT: Mr. President, usually we let the committee chairman tell us what the amendments are before we vote. So, therefore, I ask that he do that please.
