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they now allow superintendents to negotiate a three year contract whereby teachers can now negotiate only a one year contract. I think this past liberalization for superintendents indicates the initial intent that we never considered superintendents in the same classification as teachers. I would strongly urge that we support this amendment.

SPEAKER: Senator Duis.

SENATOR DUIS: Mr. President, Senator Dworak, I am going to go along with your amendment and probably from the reason that I have heard from school boards around and I think Ross Rasmussen has done his work real well. I am sorry about it for one particular reason because I would dearly hate to see an administrator unloaded just because some group didn't want him but I guess we are going to have to leave that to fate. So I will go along with your amendment because I think you have a point and I do feel as though the administrators should be responsible to their school boards directly and I sincerely hope that school boards will take into consideration every aspect of complaints brought against a superintendent.

SPEAKER: The chair recognizes Senator Simpson.

SENATOR SIMPSON: Well, Mr. President, of course, I would oppose the motion to return and I think I've delayed it about as much as I could. Every day I am trying to teach Senator Dworak one more thing about the Rules and I have already done that today. So I don't know what else I could do for him and he is trying so hard to do some things back for me on my bill and, of course, I don't agree that it should be done. The only thing that I would hope that if we go back, if this is done, if it's successful, that the people that are doing it are willing to support the bill then that those that remain in the bill shall be protected by putting this into law immediately upon the passage. I would hope that we are not doing this just to completely try to wreck the bill and hope that nobody will be for it.

SPEAKER: Senator Frank Lewis.

SENATOR FRANK LEWIS: I guess it is a little--about truth time. I have been told by everyone here that if you leave the superintendents in that the bill is going to be killed. I rise to oppose the motion. I think in good conscience fair treatment for all is necessary. I think anyone with public sector is entitled to a fair hearing. I am disappointed by those that have made an issue out of this when the issue wasn't there. I would hope that the School Board Association, which has worked on this bill, would do as much work when it comes to finance for children in an educational system. I think the relevance of this bill has been blown out of total proportion. I think it simply says that those in the public sector are entitled to a just reason for termination and anybody that doesn't believe that, I feel sorry for them.

SPEAKER: The chair recognizes Senator Nichol.

SENATOR NICHOL: Mr. Chairman and members of the Legislature, I rise to support the amendment and I think, Senator Lewis, if you want to kill the bill now, then go ahead and vote on it now. I think the thing to remember. There are four entities involved in this thing, namely, the school boards, the administration, the teachers, and the children and lastly and most important, the children. Now we can argue
