PRESIDENT: What is the specific amendment?

CLERK: The specific amendment is as follows: strike E & R amendment 2 to 81 as printed in the Journal on page 442 and adopted in the Journal on page 462. Strike the Warner amendment to LB 81 as printed and adopted in the Journal. 3) in lieu of the striken amendments on page 4 and 5, strike lines 24 to 27 and lines 1 to 5 respectively, showing the old matter as striken and insert the following: (read amendment found on page 764 in Journal).

PRESIDENT: I'll recognize Senator Warner.

SENATOR WARNER: Mr. President, I move the adoption of the amendment. The . . . what this amendment does is it corrects the language of the amendment that was offered originally on General File, which was the Grandfather Clause, which in effect said that those who had an antique license at this time and duly qualified would be permitted to retain that classification for their car as long as they sign an affidavit that it would be used for the limited purposes permitted under the bill. Somewhere in the process of amending it became written in such a fashion that some were interpreting the amendment to mean the car also had to be 30 years of age to qualify. Under that basis it was no Grandfather Clause at all. So what this does is change the language so it is identical to what I indicated it to be on General File. It clears up any possibility of misunderstanding of someone who would read the section. It would permit those presently with an antique license to maintain that license, but it would be necessary that they sign an affidavit, as would be required of additional cars that would have only limited use. I move its adoption. I move that the bill be returned for the adoption of the specific amendment.

PRESIDENT: Any further discussion? The question is the return . . . this is LB 81, the return of the bill to strike file for specific amendment. Record your vote. Record Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 30 ayes on motion to return.

PRESIDENT: Senator Warner.

SENATOR WARNER: Mr. President, I move the adoption of the amendment.

PRESIDENT: Any discussion? The question is shall the amendments . . . Senator Kremer.

SENATOR KREMER: Would Senator Warner yield to several questions?

SENATOR WARNER: Yes.

PRESIDENT: Could you answer questions Senator Warner?

SENATOR WARNER: I don't know if I can or not.
