SENATOR DWORAK: I should say no. Yes.

SENATOR KEYES: Senator Dworak would you kindly explain to me just what this bill will do after you put these amendments on it.

SENATOR DWORAK: I think that the introducer of the bill shall explain that. The only thing that the amendments do is comply with the intent of the introducer of the bill as was explained on the floor when the bill went across. So if you want to know the content or the intent of the bill you should discuss it with the introducer of the bill.

SENATOR KEYES: I am talking about the bill Senator Dworak after you put your amendments on it see. The bill as present came out of committee I understand. After you put your amendments now I want to understand what it is going to do.

PRESIDENT: Senator Koch.

SENATOR KOCH: Mr. President, members of the body, I am sure that Senator Keyes in all of his wisdom knows what is in this bill, we have already wasted enough time this morning and I move that this be advanced to E & R. We are back to the original bill Senator Keyes which will allow the state to authorize compact cars as you defined them. We struck the sub-divisions of government in the Warner amendment the other morning, and that is what we are doing now.

PRESIDENT: Senator Dworak.

SENATOR DWORAK: On the amendment on the floor Senator Keyes, one section was struck and there was reference in the original bill to sections, but because this section was struck we had to change it rather than to refer to sections, we now have to refer to the one remaining section. Do you understand that?

PRESIDENT: There has been a motion for the previous question.

SENATOR DWORAK: I'll say it again for Senator Keyes so that he understands it. But we had two sections, and on the floor and so therefore we made reference to sections because there were two sections in the bill. We struck one section on the floor which was not a E & R action, but since was section was struck on the floor, the only thing that the E & R does is to correct that rather than referring to plural sections, which when we had to sections we had a plural situation and now we have only a singular situation.

PRESIDENT: Senator Marsh has moved the previous question. The question before you is shall the debate cease on Senator Dworak's motion. Record your vote. Record Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 17 ayes, 9 nays, and 23 not voting.

PRESIDENT: Motion fails. Senator Keyes.

SENATOR KEYES: Mr. Speaker in all seriousness right now, this bill is going to be a bill that is going to have an effect on the state of Nebraska to the tune of about a million dollars in the next three or four years, and I think as citizens, not only as citizens but the representatives of citizens we have
