SENATOR LUEDTKE: My motion is to advance the bill to E & R initial. I just would like to add one comment. That is with regard to Senator Chambers remarks, I fully understand his concern for the poor people of the State of Nebraska that come up against the justice system. It's very difficult for all that have to pay these court costs. I must also remind all of us that we do have a system of taking care of indigent people who cannot pay for costs and fines, we have an installment system plan which the courts will allow these people to pay fees, particular fines, and costs in installments. They do not have to spend time in jail to do it.

PRESIDENT: The question is the advancement of LB 287. Record . . . Senator Kelly, for what purpose do you arise?

SENATOR KELLY: Are there any amendments on this bill, or are we voting on the bill as it's written?

PRESIDENT: As I understand it the offered amendment was defeated. The motion to bracket was defeated. The motion to kill was defeated, so it's the bill.

SENATOR LUEDTKE: Call of the House.

PRESIDENT: Senator Luedtke asked that the House be put under Call. Could you clear the board Mr. Clerk. Record your vote on going under Call. Record Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 22 ayes, 1 nay to go under Call.

PRESIDENT: The House is under Call. All Senators kindly take your chairs and record your presence please.

CLERK: Senator Carsten voting aye on the original motion. Senator Stull changing from no to aye.

PRESIDENT: Would we have the Senators please record your presence. There are more than . . .

CLERK: Senator Moylan voting aye on the original motion. Frank Lewis voting aye on the original motion. Senator Savage voting aye on the original motion.

PRESIDENT: I see several Senators here who have not indicated their presence. Senator Carsten. Senator Savage.

CLERK: Senator Wiltse voting aye on the original motion.

PRESIDENT: Senator Chambers, for what purpose do you arise?
