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serious issue and whether or not we follow the Constitution in a given action is a matter of opinion. I would refer you back to the time we discussed whether or not a certain individual ought to be seated in the Legislature. Now without going into the merits of that issue, some of us held one view of the Constitution, others held another view as to what the Constitution said our duty is. So in spite of the nice lecture that the Lieutenant Governor gave this morning and I think these things are wholesome and they should be engaged in, I still stand by the position that I took. The Lieutenant Governor, as a matter of fact, is a member of the Executive branch and if he will remember, I did say that I am not talking about him personally. I am talking about a situation where a member of the Executive branch presides over the Legislature. So if he took my words personally, he knows and can judge whether or not they hit the mark better than I can. I was not addressing them to him and I made that disclaimant when I began to talk. So I have one thing to say. Then I am going to give it up, Senator Barnett. If I feel something is directed to me, I will take issue with it which I expect anybody to do with me but as I always say, if there are a herd of jackasses and I throw a stone among them, the only jackass that brays is the one that's hit.

SENATOR BARNETT: I think the issue has been discussed and I, in no way, want to reflect back to the past speaker on his last statements because I am afraid I might be braying, too. So I do say this, though, that what we have is strictly an interpretation of the Constitution, regardless of what Senator Simpson thinks or Senator Marvel or anybody else. I think the chair has ruled one way and I think that there are those of us who interpret it another way and I think that this is a good way, by overriding the chair's decision, that we come to an ultimate answer for the future. Otherwise, there is going to be a question from now on out as to how many votes this appropriation or that appropriation takes. So, therefore, I hope that you would override the chair's decision.

PRESIDENT: Consistent with the phraseology used by the chair all of this session, the question is, shall the chair be sustained. Record your vote. I think we are still on Final Reading on this matter so would the Senators please take their seats. Record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 36 ayes, 8 nays, 5 not voting.

PRESIDENT: The chair is sustained.
