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ought to have somebody regulate them. This bill came from the industry from people who are running the parks in the first place.

SENATOR KOCH: That is what bothers me, because it appears to me that it their feeling that it might be easier for them to go to the department of health and get the licenses rather than go through the present zoning jurisdictions where they are having some problems.

PRESIDENT: Are you ready for the question? Senator Simpson do you care to close debate by way of reply?

SENATOR SIMPSON: Mr. President, members of the legislature, this is something that was mentioned to me and I said that I would bring it up and I think that with or without it the bill is still a good bill and I really don't have any great pride of ownership in this amendment, except that I said that I would attempt to put it on. I have no objection from the mobile home operators and owners or from anyone else until this moment as to putting this in, and I have had it there where they could see it and I wasn't trying to hide it but I don't really care whether they adopt it or not. I think that.....don't let this effect your feelings towards the bill in total.

PRESIDENT: The question is the adoption of amendments to LB91. Record your vote. Record Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 9 ayes, 18 nays.

PRESIDENT: Motion fails. Senator Simpson.

SENATOR SIMPSON: Mr. President, we have decided what form we want the bill in, so I would move to advance the bill to E & R for review. Now the purpose of this bill is to have the same type of regulations state-wide concerning mobile parks. Now we had put in some areas changes that must be made in parks that are in effective today, and in other areas we have said alright, you may continue, but some of these couldn't be changed because they were made back when we didn't have double wide trailers and all of these things so there just isn't the additional space in some of them. But the big thrust in here is that on the new trailer parks, and there are going to be a lot more of them. You see them coming all of the time and I think that they should follow some type of standard. We have had some problems, we have even had some right here in the edge of Lincoln with a water problem, where they had their own water supply and all at once we find that they have bad drinking water going into all these units. Well the State Department of Health just doesn't have the people under the present set up. They are not able to go around and check these parks even for the health problems in it. Under this they'd have two choices. They would be allowed to either do their own inspecting or, where the municipality had comparable rules and regulations or governing statutes, the local body could apply to do their own enforcing. Then this would be reviewed from time to time to see that they not only had good statutes concerning this, but they really were taking care of the problem. I think the enforcement had to be the main portion of this. So, from what the bill originally said that we should allow the larger
