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cities to do the enforcing, now it's been opened up and said everyone shall have the opportunity to set their own rules and regulations as long as they're as astringent as the state rules and regulations and they enforce them, they can do it at home. They can take care of their own units. With this I agree 100 percent. I hope that, with the licensing each year that goes on under this that, we can have a good program for something that's getting to be a bigger part of our living in Nebraska each year. That's mobile housing and mobile housing parks.

PRESIDENT: Senator Dickinson.

SENATOR DICKINSON: Mr. President, members of the body, I would like to ask a question of either the committee chairman or Mr. Simpson, Senator Simpson. I'd be interested in knowing, briefly, what the testimony was or what the concern was of S.P. Benson of the Omaha Plumbing Department and Ted Strauser, owner of an Omaha trailer park. Now do they intend . . . does Omaha intend to turn over the supervision of their trailer parks to the State Health Department? I'd, just a little bit, like to understand their interest one way of the other. Did he close? I thought he just explained the bill. Well Barnett.

PRESIDENT: You were not closing on the bill itself? No, no. This is the first statement made on the advancement of the bill itself.

SENATOR DICKINSON: Senator Kennedy, do you recall? Senator Simpson can you answer the question?

SENATOR SIMPSON: Well, Senator Dickinson, I would say that primarily these people came and we're saying that this was something that was needed, not only within Omaha, but within Douglas county and within every other city and county in the state.

SENATOR DICKINSON: The question would be how is it going to effect Omaha? Or any other area that has acceptable regulations now? I can't understand their concern. Are they trying to impose restrictions on someone else that someone else may not now have simply because they now have them?

SENATOR SIMPSON: No, I heard nothing in there that would make it any different than right now the concern partially in this is enforcement. We've had something on the books before on . . . state . . . enforcement of this, but there's been no money in the Department of Health so they've had like one inspector for the entire state. He hasn't been able to get anywhere near the amount of parks that are in the state to check to see what is happening. Often times you get a problem in local enforcement where someone specifically from outside must come in to check. This happens in Omaha just as it would any place else.

SENATOR DICKINSON: Well this means then we would have State Health Department inspectors checking on the Omaha inspection itself. Is that correct?
