CLERK: I move that the Clerk be requested to be asked to request of the Governor that he return LB 427 for further consideration by the Legislature, and specifically to strike the enacting clause. Signed, Senator Clark.

PRESIDENT: Senator Clark.

SENATOR CLARK: Mr. President, members of the body, there's been a lot said about this bill in the press. The Governor doesn't seem to want to live with Section 10 of the bill. I certainly don't want the bill if he feels as though he can't live with it. I'm sure he's reading something into the bill that I don't see in it. I don't want a bill in there that's going to cause trouble with him either. If the administration doesn't think . . . I would much prefer to get the bill back, kill it, and bring in another bill next year that would be in agreement. I would ask the Legislature to please vote to return the bill to kill it.

PRESIDENT: Any discussion on the motion? Senator Cavanaugh.

SENATOR CAVANAUGH: Well this is very pleasant surprise here Senator. Senator Clark doesn't want to enact any bills that might be offensive to the Governor. Senator Clark, my understanding is that the Governor's going to veto this bill. Why do you want to do it this way rather than let him veto it?
