Session on April 14 at 12:00 Noon, Room 1019. Signed, Senator Hasebroock. Mr. President, the Government Committee gives notice that its hearing this afternoon will be in 1003 at 1:00. Signed, Senator Rasmussen. Mr. Chairman, I move that we recess until 2:00. Signed, J. W. Burbach.

PRESIDENT: A motion to recess until 2:00. All those in favor say aye. We are adjourned until 2:00.

PRESIDENT: The Legislature will please come to order. Record your presence. Would all of you please record your presence.

CLERK: Senator Goodrich asked to be excused this afternoon.

PRESIDENT: I don't blame him. Have all of you recorded your presence? If we're going to have 2:00 sessions, we ought to start at 2:00. Record Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: Quorum present, Mr. President. Mr. President, your Committee on Retirement to whom is referred LB 37 instructs me to report the same and the Legislature the recommendation that it be advanced to General File. Signed, W. H. Hasebroock, Chairman.

PRESIDENT: Would the Sargent at Arms please find Senator Duis.

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator Duis asks unanimous consent to withdraw his motion to indefinitely postpone LB 118.

PRESIDENT: Are there objections to the request for unanimous consent? Seeing none, it is so ordered. The Chair recognizes Senator Duis.

SENATOR DUIS: About all I can say is thank you sir. I am sorry, I just heard over the mike that I was wanted and it has already been taken care of, so thank you very much.

PRESIDENT: I think your constituents would be glad to know that matters get handled better by you when you're not here.

SENATOR DUIS: Well, let's put it this way. At least they're smoother aren't they.

CLERK: LB 360. Introduced by Senator Burrows of the 30th District. Bill read. Mr. President, there are no committee amendments. There are a series of other amendments.

PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes Senator Burrows.

SENATOR BURROWS: The purpose of this bill is to broaden existing bonding procedures and regulations that extends over the elevators. Both the commercial ones, the cooperatives to include any cooperative selling agency. Now there has been loss to farmers in the state through cooperatives efforts in selling of grain. I think you could say it would exceed a million dollars in the past year. I feel it is essential for protection to the farmers to broaden this protection that's already existent on the books .
