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of the quality of furniture that is brought in of course. But, there is no restriction on them in this bill. It is only in the federal government. You say that you assume that you wouldn't have this type of merchandise in your place of business because there is a federal regulation against this. If so, I can see no reason for the bill in Nebraska.

SENATOR CAVANAUGH: The point is that if...I don't think that it is a major problem. The point is that if some problem does exist, I don't think that a citizen in the state of Nebraska should have to come to a state agency and say, well we don't have any, or to state government, or county government and have everybody tell them that.... there is nothing that we can do about that. We don't have any law on it. It is well accepted Senator Clark that these kinds of materials should not be disseminated for public use. It is well settled in Federal law. All we are saying is that the state also has an interest to protect the children in the same way that the Federal Government has found an interest and the citizens of this state feel that there is an existing hazard they shouldn't have to necessarily go to a federal agency we can appropriately and economically provide a state remedy, if a citizen in the state of Nebraska feels that there is a problem and there is a problem and there is a problem.

SENATOR CLARK: Do you know of any problems in the state?

SENATOR CAVANAUGH: I know of no specific problem in this area. I simply say that if one were to occur or exist, there is no reason why we should not provide the people of this state with a remedy or a solution.

SENATOR CLARK: Alright this is....

SENATOR CAVANAUGH: It isn't going to cost you anything. What is the big problem?

SENATOR CLARK: To get bit by a horse maybe and we ought to get rid of the problem now.

SENATOR CAVANAUGH: Well vote against the bill, I don't care.

PRESIDENT: Senator Moylan, do you care to close?

SENATOR MOYLAN: Well Mr. President, there is one point that comes to mind that might come up. I don't think that we would have any problem with legitimate distributors or retailers in the state. However there are transient salesmen that come around, and maybe offer such things, without having too many regulations on him. They can sneak into a state and they can sell material, toys and the like and this would give the state government some regulation of these people. I move for the advancement of the bill.

PRESIDENT: Question is shall the bill be advanced. Record your vote. Record Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 29 ayes, 0 nays and 20 not voting.
