SENATOR SAVAGE: The motion fails.

PRESIDENT: Senator Clark. The question is shall the Call be raised. Record your vote. Record.

CLERK: 27 ayes to raise the Call.

SPEAKER: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, you have on your desk this morning those bills of the top priority . . . not necessarily top priority, they are all top priority bills, bills that were requested by this body to me for discussion. I indicated the other day . . . I had asked the advice and the council of our two former speakers and myself to determine which bills we felt may be subject to a veto, and then if this happens then this body, if it so desired, could accept that veto or override that veto. They were not placed there because of the extreme importance of the bill, or the minority problems in the bill, the minor. They were there because we felt that all bills which we can possibly have an opportunity to override, if this body so desires, could be completed with the Budget bills and any other bills that may come about. Now then we are now completed with 344, 417, when we get to General File it will be the first order of legislation. There are two of the bills, 204, 215, 305, 311 and 342 I believe, they are set
