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got technical about it. You cannot have the Executive Board speak for the Legislature. In this case, you certainly would be doing that. You cannot give the Executive Board this power.

SPEAKER: Senator Mahoney.

SENATOR MAHONEY: Mr. President, I just wonder if Senator Stull's amendment and the other amendments that we've had here would really be that relevant to this particular bill. I just wonder why this bill with the tax increase and a later bill that we had that we would be attaching those amendments. I'd like to ask Senator Stull a few things.

SPEAKER: Senator Stull, do you yield?

SENATOR STULL: Yes, Senator Mahoney, it's my understanding that this amendment, by the proper information where it fits into the bill, would either go into 589 or 167.

SENATOR MAHONEY: Well, I just wondered, Mr. President. The reason I state that is, of course, this bill has enormous importance as it goes across because it's going to paying for the increase of what state government we have. Possibly these amendments are going to be more of a hazard as it goes across and could cause great problems in the next week or two as we see it takes its tedious road along the way to passage. It would be probably more important that the bill not have any amendments that are going to drag it down or cause it to limp across and possibly be defeated because of a question such as this. That's my concern and I thought I ought to speak that to the rest of the Legislature because there would be some members here who would not want to vote for it and could very definitely use for an excuse this particular amendment is reason why not to increase the income tax.

SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes Senator Keyes.

SENATOR KEYES: Mr. Speaker, I don't believe that many people think like I do on this and I am very concerned but I'll ask unanimous consent to withdraw my amendment to the Stull amendment and then vote his amendment down.

SPEAKER: Senator Keyes, you withdraw your amendment? Any objections? If not, so ordered. Any motions on the desk?

CLERK: I move to adjourn.

SPEAKER: A motion made and seconded that we adjourn. All in favor indicate by the usual sign. Opposed? We are adjourned.
