sincerity and honesty to present them to you as the Appropriations Committee has always done. I think that 589 is now in a position to move forward, to be adopted. If there is a difference at the end of this year, 1975, the Board of Equalization, when it sits in November, can look with the information as 589 now provides and make a decision on whether we need to increase or decrease the 13 and the 2 1/2 percent. I think that the bill has been fully discussed and has been kicked around quite readily. I would urge that we do move it on to E & R initial. Thank you.

PRESIDENT: The question is shall 589 be advanced. Record your vote. Have you voted? Please vote. Have you all voted? Senator Carsten.

SENATOR CARSTEN: I will not call for a Call of the House, Mr. President, at this time. Apparently, it is the wish of the body that the bill not move. If that's their desire, I will abide. Thank you.

CLERK: 21 ayes, 21 nays, 7 not voting.

I believe it's maybe on Final Reading or E & R for engrossing, LB 598 which certainly will not take long. There is an amendment for it. This is a bill that must be read on Final Reading this Friday, I believe, Senator Clark has informed me. We'll now take up LB 577, Senator Kremer's bill.
