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be the most probable use for the Pershing College facility. Now what this means is that we are developing a totally new and separate and distinct University system, the intent of which is to be adventually totally funded by state dollars. We all know that. We all know that the \$125,000 is nothing other than our commitment for the future of the total funding of SUN. That is what it is all about. They could get along with \$25,000 as long as this body makes the commitment and as long as the foot is in the door, then the system is fine. Now we are confronted with an obligation here as to whether we are going to create a new and distinct and separate educational institution with a full grown campus or whether at a minimum we are going to fund SUN as an alternative educational system. I assure you and I argue vigorously to you that if we allow the SUN program to headquarter in the Pershing College Campus that they will fill the dorms and they will fill the class rooms and that you will have a separate institutional academic system. Called SUN. It will cease to be purely and simply a mass media dissemination system to provide educational opportunities in those sections of the state where they are not institutionally available. That is what the whole direction of Pershing College is all about. That is why it was acquired. This was to establish this separate system. Were going to have to pay for it. Were going to have to pay for it even though we never considered it, and even though it was never talked about. That is why were talking about it today. I have no desire to inhibit SUN from engaging in what President Varner says they want to engage in which is a system funded by private and Federal monies. I encourage that. I think that the SUN system is admirable, if it can survive and deliver a quality educational program with federal and private monies. They have done a commendable job up to now. But if they want to come in here and take the tax dollars of the state of Nebraska, we in this Legislature carry a heavy burden to assure that we are not doing it in a duplicative manner. That were not going to start a full campus. That is the only proper purpose to which you can put the Pershing College campus. Those remarks, I move the adoption of my amendment to my amendment to limiting it to a headquarters.

PRESIDENT: Senator Burrows.

SENATOR BURROWS: (no response).

PRESIDENT: In the absence of any objection your amendment will be amended as outlined by you Senator. Senator Burrows.

SENATOR BURROWS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, I think that there has been a great deal of misleading information presented here. Now Pershing was acquired by the foundation without the full public hearing that might have taken if it had gone directly to the University. However, I think that it has been over looked since this time the education committee held the hearing on the acquisition of Pershing that a full hearing before the education committee was held discussing the acquisition of Pershing. The education committee toured Pershing as a facility and found it a
