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consolidations of activities, functions, and services and alternatives to include a single extension division for the University system. In view of that direction of the appropriations committee, I think that what were attempting to do here by way of amendments, and amendments to the amendment I think is not necessary that we should get to the business of 610 and act on that.

PRESIDENT: Do you care to close Senator Lewis.

SENATOR LEWIS: I don't want to take any time. It is just the point that if your going to accept the Cavanaugh amendment, which I have already urged you to reject, but if you are going to accept it at least my amendment ought to be on there to see that the program a can be continued on an on going manner.

PRESIDENT: The question is the adoption of Senator Lewis' amendment to Senator Cavanaugh's amendment. Record your vote. Vote promptly according to Senator Syas that is very important. Have you voted? Record Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 15 ayes, 16 nays.

PRESIDENT: Motion fails.

CLERK: Mr. President, we have the Cavanaugh amendment as amended by himself.

PRESIDENT: At the time we left, I was about to recognize Senator Koch.

SENATOR KOCH: Mr. President, members of the body, I would just make a couple of remarks in regards to Senator Cavanaugh amendment. Senator Cavanaugh is very much concerned about the future of Pershing College, and as he was when he appeared for the education committee. I would like to remind the members of this body and Senator Cavanaugh if he were present that Pershing was a gift to the foundation. Prior to the utilization of this gift by the University system there would be by necessity a full and complete hearing as to the exact purposes of that utilization by the University system. Once again, I think that this removes all suspicion that the board of regents at the University would just automatically go to Pershing College and establish a system away from the UNL system here at Lincoln, Nebraska. I would hope that you would keep that in mind. Secondly, as I have said before and I will re-emphasize again, that the SUN program is still a very young program and an experimental one in much of its efforts, I think that all we should be doing today is to allow the SUN program to reach some maturation before we become too critical as to what it attempts to do for the people of Nebraska. Therefore I urge you to vote down the Cavanaugh amendment and allow the SUN program to continue and what I think will be a brilliant future.

PRESIDENT: Senator Barnett.
