PRESIDENT: Well, Senator Dickinson may...he moved to reconsider.

SENATOR WARNER: My problem Mr. President, is that there are some bills later on that have money that if they are passed they are very low priorities as far as I am concerned compared to 368 but obviously the revenue is not there to do them both, and I think that it would be much easier...

PRESIDENT: Excuse me Senator Warner, I don't think that this is the time for discussion. We ought to have something before us.

SENATOR WARNER: I was totally aware of that Mr. President. I didn't know how long you would let me go?

PRESIDENT: I know, this is about it. Thank you. I think that we have reached the point. Do you want to do anything Senator Dickinson?

SENATOR DICKINSON: If it is proper to reread it now that is the motion I make.

PRESIDENT: We don't need a motion, if that is your request we are now on Final Reading. Do you have any objections to this Mr. Speaker?

SPEAKER: I have no objections at all.

PRESIDENT: We are on Final Reading. Would all Senators please take their chairs. All non-senatorial personnel please leave the floor. Mr. Clerk, Senator Warner.

SENATOR WARNER: Mr. President, would it be in order now or would I have to wait until after the vote to move that the bill be held by the Legislature until completion of the reading of 611 and the other bills?

PRESIDENT: Well that is...

SENATOR WARNER: Would I have to wait for the vote?

PRESIDENT: No, it is up to you. Senator Dickinson wants it read now.

SENATOR WARNER: I move that if the bill passes that it will not go to the Governor's desk until Final Reading is completed this afternoon. Those bills that are scheduled.

PRESIDENT: We can't do that now, were going to read it now. Mr. Clerk please read. All Senators take your seats.
