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determination of what the rate should be. Enough can be done by any group of people, 3, 4, 5 get together. It is a mechanical computation of where we are. If we leave rate setting go until that last day, when our budget bills which ever ones that were talking about come in the last day, late in the session. The 75th or 80th day or thereabouts, and this is an annual happening so I ask you to leave the board of equalization to determine these rates and to save this amendment.

PRESIDENT: Senator Keyes.

SENATOR KEYES: Mr. Speaker, Senator Warner may say that it is the same God Damn story, I don't listen. But I am listening.

PRESIDENT: We don't have that kind of language in this Chamber, Senator.

SENATOR KEYES: Mr. Speaker, I'm going to back Senator Burbach's amendment because I don't think that there is any way and we proved that yesterday on the floor of the Legislature, there is no way that we can come here and look at a magic board and know what the spending is going to be. Senator Burbach has one of the finest amendments to this bill that you have ever seen and we should do so right down the line, for this year, next year and the following years.

PRESIDENT: Senator Kelly.

SENATOR KELLY: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, attention Senator Burbach. I supported your amendment yesterday on the statement that your amendment changed only the meeting date of the equalization board and did not disturb any other parts of the bill and I understand that your amendment took us back to 10% on the income tax rate. Is that correct or incorrect?

SENATOR BURBACH: It was in error yesterday and let me tell you why I was in error. It was certainly not an intentional error. Just prior to the discussion of the Warner amendment I was getting very concerned about our deliberations here. I called for Emory Burnett and you all know who he, and his responsibility. I asked him to draft me the amendments. He brought the amendments too me, immediately after the Warner amendment had been adopted. I did not have time to go through them nor did he know that the Warner amendments were adopted at that time. I say to you that this was right during a the time of the adoption of the Warner amendment. I did not know whether Emory Burnett was aware of the adoption of the amendment. I did not know or did nothave time to study the amendment, it was just brought to me and this is why it is as it is and I said on this floor yesterday, that if I'm in error, I will be very happy to work on this bill again on Select File and make any proper changes for any mis-information that I may have had. I knew that this was in the middle of debate and E. Burnett did not know it. I did not know if he had his squack box on and injected this into that amendment or not.
