PRESIDENT: Motion fails. Senator DeCamp.

SENATOR DE CAMP: Just a question of the Chair so we don't run into conflict later. What about motions to indefinitely postpone, they were never brought up here and it takes a simple majority on general file. What happens on Select? This kind of question.

PRESIDENT: Under the amended motion I would say that that would not be entertained by the Chair.

SENATOR DE CAMP: But there was no mention.

PRESIDENT: Well if the bill doesn't get the vote, it doesn't get advanced.

SENATOR DE CAMP: Well....

PRESIDENT: As I understand it, this is a matter to say up or down and the bills that have strength. The question is shall the call be raised? Record your vote. Senator Mills for what purpose do you rise?

SENATOR MILLS: A question of the Chair. Mr. President, where is the controversial 394, the controversial no fault insurance bill fall on the priority list?

PRESIDENT: Well we already put it to a vote Senator, it is a little late to do it. Record your vote on raising the call. Record.

CLERK: 17 ayes, 18 nays, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: Motion fails. Were still under call. Senator Burbach could you assist the Clerk in expediting these bills.

CLERK: LB383, read.

PRESIDENT: The question is shall the bill be advanced? I don't think that there is any debate on this motion. Move to advance the bill? The question is shall the bill be advanced. Record your vote. Senator Warner.

SENATOR WARNER: A point of information from the Chair, I think that they are advanced as introduced, Committee Amendments are stripped.

CLERK: Senator Frank Lewis clarified the point that he wanted to strip the amendments.

PRESIDENT: They will be introduced on Select. Have you voted? Were still under call so if this procedure is going to accomplish much we really should vote promptly. Have you voted? Record. Senator Kremer.

SENATOR KREMER: A point of clarification. Are all motions going to have a roll call vote? We can have a roll call vote?

PRESIDENT: I really don't think that his motion was that broad, I think that you could ask for a roll call vote at any time. That has nothing to do with the substance of the bill.
