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We are going to have irrigators and nonirrigators, but principally nonirrigators are going to be making the decision as to how this is to be used. Again, I caution you when you adopt this amendment, if you do, to recognize that you are proceeding down the path of extreme regulation. It may not be as wise a year from now as it appears to be today. Senator Syas . . . and I recognize him and I know he's sincere about the necessity for doing something. I appreciate the sincere interest of the urban senators. But the most important factor we want to remember is that we do not do the wrong thing. Every day on this floor we infringe upon business and industry and agriculture to a certain extent and with some justification. But let's not infringe any further than is absolutely necessary. I sit here this morning and I listen to the debate. I'm almost inclined to change my position on the Bereuter amendment because I am concerned about the regulation and where the power shall be vested, and what shall happen if the wrong individual or individuals are vested with that power. I hope there will be additional debate. I think it's the most important bill we have discussed this session. I think we should take all the time necessary. I urge all of you, rural and urban senators, to debate the issue.

PRESIDENT: Senator Barnett.

SENATOR BARNETT: How many other lights are on the board? I have two or three questions because I see the Speaker had down that we were taking Select File number 577. 577's over Final Reading. I guess . . .

PRESIDENT: Just the motion to return, Senator.

SENATOR BARNETT: Are we taking that out of order then?

PRESIDENT: No, it's the first bill up and it's the motion to return.

SENATOR BARNETT: OK. Well I think there's been enough discussion. I think there's other work we've got to do. It got over to Final Reading with a lot of debate. I very seldom disagree with Senator Schmit because he says we should discuss this all day. I would imagine if you look down through these numbers you'd find out why. I agree with him. It's had discussion. It's over there. If they can't decide which way they want to go in this body maybe we should bracket that bill over there on Final Reading and let it set during the interim and they could get together on what to do with the water problem. I would hope and think they have probably discussed this long enough. I'd call for the question.

PRESIDENT: There are no other lights on. Senator Bereuter do you want to close debate by way of reply?

SENATOR BEREUTER: Yes, Mr. President. I'd just remind my good friend Senator Schmit that there are regulations in the bill, but that I didn't put them there. What I'm
