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that we get all mixed up, and we go in all different directions, when 417 was introduced, it provided for a facility at Lincoln, didn't it?

SENATOR LUEDTKE: That is correct.

SENATOR KEYES: Gentlemen, sometime after the hearing we decided on two facilities and the Governor and the committee, Senator Luedtke, decided on one facility. Now, I don't know which is best, but neither one of us is too strict in what we follow. We have come along here and we have deviated from what we started out with. Not the hearing, but on the floor of this Legislature, we've strained it from one facility to one in Omaha and one in Lincoln. Now, I have just as much respect for the Governor of this state as I do for a lot of my senators out here, and I have never spoken to the Governor before in my life, but as it stands right now, I'm not going to vote to override. I want you to listen to Senator Frank Lewis make the statements that we're going to get boxed in, and I talked to Senator Shirley Marsh this morning and she said we are going to get boxed in and the Governor will veto and veto on this bill and the facility at Lincoln will be vetoed out and we will have nothing. Well, I'll let you know, if the Governor of this state through Senator Kelly is making the statement that Senator Kelly made, then the Governor of this state cannot veto the one facility out here at Lincoln. He can't do it and ever expect to get elected Governor or even get elected to be Chief of Police of Padoka, because this is the way it is. No man can come along and make statements and then not live up to them. I have some things in 609, I wish the Governor would come out and say he wanted me to put 417 on 609, that he will not veto anything on 609 and I'll certainly support that. But to come along and say that we are going to let the Governor veto it after he brings it back and we put it on 609, my friends, that's just not the honest way to operate. I believe that we on the floor of this Legislature and the man that sits in the office over there is half way honest, at least. So, let's kill this bill. Let's not override the Governor's veto, let's put it on 609 and do what Senator Luedtke started out to do at the start of the session. Thank you.

PRESIDENT: Senator Dickinson.

SENATOR DICKINSON: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, I would like to ask a question of Senator Chambers if I may. Senator Chambers, I believe that...I'm not quite sure I understand your implications...were you saying in fact.... Senator Keyes has brought up most of the things that I had on my mind. Were you saying that, in fact, the Governor could and you thought would then strike the item from 609 and you would have nothing in regard to a reformatory complex?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I'm going to try to answer without... Senator Keyes said the Governor is half way honest. That could mean that he is half way dishonest too. I think a human being
