PRESIDENT: The motion fails. Senator Swigart, for what
purpose do you arise?

SENATOR SWIGART: Mr. President, I rise to a point of

SENATOR SWIGART: I think it's literally a point of order.
In the incident that happened a bit ago, I'm not speaking
now to blame anybody because I think things happen spon-
taneously and quickly. Maybe it's not that we didn't
follow through in what I think was the best way to handle
the case. When anything like that happens I would prefer
that we would establish a rule that we first caution the
person who speaks out. Whether it's a spontaneous hand
clap you have from an audience, or whether it's maybe a
spontaneous speaking, like this gentlemen did, I believe
this young man responded quickly when he was advised to
leave. I think he would have responded if we were to
simply say, speaking from the audience here is not per-
mitted. So without blaming anybody I think these things
happen in a spontaneous way. This young man was moved
about this bill. I think it was just spontaneous that he
spoke out. I don't think he meant ... there was any great
disturbance. I believe we ought to establish a policy of
first being courteous with the citizen and saying to him
