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Senator Warner says it's improper that out of a historical connection members of this Legislature receive football tickets and therefore some how we are corrupted. That's totally untrue and is designed only to placate Senator Warner's desire to play the role of the holier than thou legislator. So I would hope that that section would be stricken. I'd also move to strike all of the other sections after the resolve. I think that there are legitimate reasons and causes for distribution of free football tickets that benefit the University of Nebraska, that benefit its public relations effort which is a vital part of any public institution, educational or atheletic. I think it's an important integral part of the national reputation that the people of the State of Nebraska find desirable to be connected with their football team. I think in the main that that authority and that responsibility is not abused. I think that the only legitimate part of this resolution is to discontinue or encourage the discontinuance of that practice of giving tickets to public officials which originated solely out of a matter of courtesy and respect to those public officials by an institution or subdivision of government. It no longer fits the temper or desires of the time and probably should be discontinued with no disparagement upon those people who perpuated it and no disparagement upon those people who included themselves in the historical system that grew up. It's a very simple thing and I think that it should be a very simple resolution that simply encourages the Board of Regents to do that very simply. We do not have to criticize ourselves or them in the process, and certainly not criticize ourselves because we have many other areas in which we are subject to criticism. Just make one further comment that I would assume one of the motivations of Senator Warner for introducing this resolution was the flury that arose over the Public Service Commission. In the case of the Public Service Commission they were receiving football tickets, or it was alleged I don't recall how it came out, that they received football tickets from members . . . from persons who did business before the Public Service Commission. Now there's nothing in Senator Warner's resolution. In fact under the existing state of our lobby law there is nothing that would prohibit us from receiving football tickets from lobbyists. Senator Warner apparently feels that it would be corrupt for us to receive them from the University of Nebraska, a public institution. It would not be improper for us to receive them from private lobbyists who curry favor daily in the Legislature. I just submit that to you for your consideration of its own incongruity. I move the adoption of the amendment.

PRESIDENT: Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. Chairman and members of the Legislature, I have an amendment up there too, but I'll comment on Senator Cavanaugh's. The only reason I'm going to mention what my amendment would do is because I think it kind of overlaps his. Mine in that whereas it deals with propriety would simply strike those words . . . it would strike
