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the first two resolves and leave the request from the Legislature that the Board of Regents provide a list of all people who receive tickets. I don't think that the Board of Regents or the University should give free football tickets to legislators. Senator Cavanaugh, Senator Warner may be holier than thou but he's not holier than I. I've never accepted a free football ticket and I won't. I'm not trying to say that those who accept the tickets have anything wrong with them. I do believe that the University gives these tickets to Senators for the purpose of creating an amiable attitude toward the University. It certainly is not designed to create antimosity and hostility. Every Senator, every public official has a salary fixed by statute. I believe that when you can count every year on something of substantial value being given to you that is an illegal and improper increase in your salary. I do feel it is improper. I feel it is absolutely improper, unjustifiable and indefensible for public officials who have their salaries set by statute to receive these free tickets every year. I think it is totally wrong. However, in establishing priorities I must agree with Senator Cavanaugh that there is some bigger fish to fry than these football tickets. The night, oh that infamous night when the lobby bill was killed. The lobbyists had done their work so well that they could go party even before the carcass, even before the object was made into a carcass by killing it. Partying, partying with those who work for the Legislature. Paying, I won't say off but paying out. I'm sure it costs the lobbyists something. What is that little bit of expenditure in comparison to being able to operate on an . . . under an umbrella of secrecy, under a cloak of protection from this Legislature. I'm in favor of the resolution if it's amended to keep tabs on the people who receive the tickets. I know that those who receive a benefit are not going to stop themselves from receiving it. You cannot get, Senator Warner, this Legislature to vote to not give themselves something from the public trough. They are not going to do it. I would like to know who gets the tickets though. That's why my amendment is being offered. If Senator Cavanaugh's is accepted then I will not offer mine because I see that the purpose of the body as a whole is to just do away with the resolution altogether. I don't want to waste time. I do think it could serve a valuable purpose if it is amended. I would like to see it as it stands now. Obviously, it's too strong for senatorial stomachs because right now I'm sure some people can hear over their shoulder and in their inner ear those people who are going to be very angry with them if the Legislature stops them from getting free handouts from the University.
