SENATOR BURBACH: Proceed.

CLERK: Mr. President, new bills. Read title to LB 845, 846, 847.

That's all I have, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: Senator Burbach.

SENATOR BURBACH: Mr. President,

PRESIDENT: Wait just a minute. Senator Kennedy is running for the Clerk.

CLERK: Read title to LB 848. That's all, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: Senator Burbach.

SENATOR BURBACH: Mr. President, members of the Legislature. If anyone has a bill on their desk and they're not ready to turn it in at this time, would you please turn it in at the Clerk's Office anytime this afternoon so we can read it into the record at the earliest time possible tomorrow, so we can proceed and have the bills printed and whatever work is necessary such as assigning it to a committee, public hearing, etc.

I would renew my request that if any of those bills that are not in the bracket position ... if we discuss them tomorrow, if time permits, I would be hopeful you would set them for some date certain so that we could move along with those bills and clean up General File before we get too many new ones.

Consequently, I make a motion that we adjourn now till 9 o'clock tomorrow morning.

PRESIDENT: Senator Keyes, for what purpose do you want to be recognized?

SENATOR KEYES: Could I ask Senator Burbach a question across the room like this so everybody else can hear?

PRESIDENT: Yes sir.

SENATOR KEYES: Senator Burbach, I still have two bills that haven't come up that I want to introduce. I was told Friday that if I got them in they were in. They haven't come back to me yet. Now when they come back I would like to introduce them, if that's this afternoon or tomorrow morning.

SENATOR BURBACH: Oh there's no shut-off until tomorrow noon, or possibly even tomorrow evening. I might say that I did visit with Emory Burnett, the Bill Drafter, just a few moments ago. They are going to work very late this evening to accomplish that thing that you're attempting to do, Senator Keyes.

CLERK: I move we adjourn until 9 o'clock.
