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living, and in so doing, we would recognize the rights of the unborn. Senator Chambers does not believe in capital punishment, not for any crime, I am sure. In this case, in my belief, we inflict capital punishment upon an individual guilty of no crime. So in closing, I would like to support Senator Kremer and his Resolution. I support him honestly and sincerely, and if I know no inconsistency in doing so with my past and present action as a member of this body.

PRESIDENT: Senator Koch.

SENATOR KOCH: Mr. President, fellow members, I rise to speak to the issue of the Resolution. I, too, have strong feelings about abortion and I wouldn't want Senator Chambers to think that those of us who may support this Resolution are completely anti in our concerns and our emotions. Senator Chambers, also, alluded to the fact that the federal government is not responsible for the busing. I would only remind him that the history of busing started a long time ago when that court said that as long as our institutions are all equal they can remain separate and apart from. In 1954, the court changed that decision and said, for this day forward, we will do away with that opinion, which was the law of the land, the separate with equal cause. So, I say that if the federal government in their wisdom many, many years ago had then said we will not provide or allow separate but equal from this day forward in the early days of this nation, we wouldn't be fighting the battle today and we are in busing and a lot of other things. So the federal government does have responsibility and so does the great court of the land. I am here to say that I ran for this office based upon the fact that there should be an amendment to reconsider the action of the Supreme Court because I think it went too far in terms of what they allow for a legal abortion. By the same token, I absolutely oppose the fact that there should not be some legal means for abortion because that way none of us could tolerate the butcher shops and some of the things that were happening to people throughout this nation a few years ago. So I am here to merely provide, and I think I speak for a lot of the members in this body. I don't try to speak for all of them but I think they share my philosophy and I am trying to say it very clearly without any emotion that what we are trying to do with this Resolution is this, that the Congress, in its wisdom, should review the decision and they should provide an amendment which is, I think, adequate to the needs of all. I am not either anti abortion or completely the other way. Thank you.

PRESIDENT: Senator Shirley Marsh.

SENATOR MARSH: Mr. President and members of this legislative body, I stand to speak for the poor of our land and of our state. I feel sad that the men in this body assume that if you stop having legal abortions you will stop abortions. This is not true. I have seen the mothers who have illegal abortions and how their lives were affected. As the mother of six children, I am not advocating abortion but I am speaking for those poor
