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probably by the Department of Health, and a whole great new division within the Department of Health concerning housing and standards of building and construction, and we do that without any great questioning but the sole justification that this is the most expeditious manner for modular housing developers to proceed at this point in time in the State of Nebraska. So you have catered and solicited and completely conformed to whatever they wish without any regard to the consequences or the integrity of the matter and I think it is a little bit shameful.

PRESIDENT: Senator Syas.

SENATOR SYAS: I think it is pretty well covered but I do want to mention one thing. A few years ago I had the Research Director look up how many Commissions and Committees that the Legislature had put into statutes and I think it was 140 some. Now we are putting in another one. This Legislature is slap happy to make boards and commissions. We talk about the federal government. We get lost in the bureaucracy back here because they have got, I forgot, in the other night's paper, how many thousands commissions and boards they have got, advisory and otherwise. So here we are again going through the same old thing and then we will all probably go out and make speeches criticizing the federal government on what they are doing and I will bet you that every one of you will say we should cut down on so many boards and commissions while you vote for this one today.

PRESIDENT: Senator Burbach, will you close debate, please?

SENATOR BURBACH: Mr. President, and members of the Legislature, you just heard Senator Cavanaugh say that people have special interest in this financial or otherwise. Do organized labor who serve on this Board, do they have a special financial interest in home building? I ask you, do they? Sure there is employment but is there a direct special interest. The municipal building inspector, where do they make any dollars out of this? So I would like to leave this with you and correct the statements that there was only selfish interest on this Board. Maybe organized labor is selfish interest. I can't visualize that it is and I know the municipal building inspector don't have any there either. So I think we should go ahead with this bill now. It has been well discussed, as I indicated before, it is a fair bill. That the building industry of modular homes is a growing industry and we are going to see more and more of it and this is the time, right now, when we help to protect the people, whether they are buyers or those people that live in these homes, and the industry itself, that we proceed in an orderly fashion and pass LB 248.

PRESIDENT: The question is, shall LB 248 be advanced? Record your vote. Have you all voted? Record.

CLERK: 30 ayes, 10 nays, 9 not voting.

PRESIDENT: The bill is advanced. LB 76. Wait just a second. The Clerk has some things to read into the record.
