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past has not fulfilled this obligation. They purchased a tremendous amount of money, a tremendous amount of land which they said in a very loosely drawn ten-fifteen year program that they were going to develop certain projects. These projects have not been developed systematically and, consequently, in this state, we have gotten in trouble. All you have to do to find out how much trouble we have gotten into is to find out how often the recreation areas, the parks, are policed, whether or not they are open for a full season, and whether the projects that were promised to be developed really have been developed. You will find that the plans really haven't gone as they have seen fit and one of the reasons is that the Department thinks that the money that is given them earmarked belongs to them and, in effect, they don't have to report. So, Senator Syas, or somebody in this Legislature, Senator Dworak, I wish you would report to us as to exactly what kind of a long range plan we have, where is this long range plan. Let us take a look at it before you ask us to move into a project which is, I understand, a multi million dollar project. I don't protest the project. I protest the way that the money is given to the Department without the accountability that we have to have, if we are ever going to keep out of the dilemma that the Game Commission is now in.

PRESIDENT: He asked you to give a report. I didn't hear a question. Senator Maresh. Your light is on, Senator Syas, in due time but Senator Maresh.

SENATOR MARESH: Mr. President, I would like to speak on the bill, not the amendment.

PRESIDENT: I beg your pardon, Senator Maresh.

SENATOR MARESH: Mr. President, I would like to speak on the bill, not the amendment.

PRESIDENT: Yes, sir. all right. Senator Warner, did you want to speak on the amendment? Senator Dickinson, on the bill? Senator Schmit, on the bill or the amendment?

SENATOR SCHMIT: Mr. President, I would like to just speak briefly on the amendment. At the present time, I would be opposed to the amendment. The reason for my opposition is that I am afraid that what will occur will be that the money with which the Game and Parks Commission will be operating and in cooperation with Natural Resource Districts may very well wind up in a position where condemnation of land will take place because the Natural Resource Districts have the ability to condemn land and I certainly do not want to be a party to providing money, General Fund revenue, to the Natural Resource Districts for the purpose of buying habitat that might wind up in an condemnatory proceeding, and so at the present time, I would have to oppose the amendment.
