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it to \$2 a day for the five day fishing permit and on line 19 for a season's nonresidents fishing permit, I would change from \$20 to \$25. I am proposing to raise them higher than what the bill has. I don't think it's unreasonable, the figures that I have given, and I would ask for your support to adopt my amendment.

PRESIDENT: Senator Stoney, do you wish to speak on this amendment or the bill? This amendment.

SENATOR STONEY: Mr. President, I have a question of Senator Dworak, please. Senator Dworak, with reference to Senator Rasmussen's proposed amendment, can you give me any figures on the nonresidents that do hunt here in the State of Nebraska as compared to those residents that hunt here.

SENATOR DWORAK: No, I can get them for you, Senator.

SENATOR STONEY: Is the sum large or small? Are we talking about a minimal amount of people that come to our state to hunt or is it a sufficient number?

SENATOR DWORAK: In parts of the state, the nonresident pressure is heavier than other parts of the state. At Lake McConaughy, for an example, we have heavy nonresident pressure from Colorado. In the southwestern part of the state, McCook, the southwestern reservoir, we have nonresident pressure from Kansas and so that is as close as I can give you estimates on that. Up in the northeastern part of the state, we do have some nonresident pressure from South Dakota in answer to your question.

SENATOR STONEY: I noticed, Senator Dworak, now that I have asked you the question, Senator Koch has pointed out that on the fiscal impact statement there are some figures on the nonresidents. The only thing that concerns me about increasing the nonresident fee too high is that, then, those individuals that would hunt and fish in our state would no longer wish to come here. So I think you can really go too far in raising the rates too high. So if they are minimal numbers, rather than lose them totally, I would rather see the rates that are adopted by the original bill stay intact rather than raise that and force these individuals out.

PRESIDENT: Senator Dworak, for what purpose do you ask recognition?

SENATOR DWORAK: I wish to discuss the Rasmussen amendment.

PRESIDENT: Senator George's light is on next, Senator.

SENATOR GEORGE: Mr. President, I have a question of Senator Rasmussen, if he would yield. Senator Rasmussen, could you give me some idea of how these nonresident fees would compare to those of surrounding states like Iowa, Missouri, or Colorado? Would this be out of line or would this be pretty much the same
