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society and their remedies are one that we should all share within the society and I think that those of you in this Legislature who think otherwise reduce yourselves to the smallest levels of pettiness and selfishness and self preventualism and protectionism. You do not recognize that the issue of quality education throughout our society and the integration of our society is a total social involvement, whether you live in Aurora or the suburbs of Omaha, your responsibility to that social issue is the same. So that when we look at solving it, we look at who is going to pay for it, and certainly I feel that in the case of busing, the most appropriate person to pay for it or political entity is the federal government because it is a national responsibility, a national obligation and certainly a national infliction. The racial divisions that we have created in this country belong to all of us who live here and the deficiencies in the apportionment of government services and education belong to all of us who live in the country but they have refused to do it so I think the next best thing, the only conscionable thing for the people of the State of Nebraska is to recognize their obligation to this burden and this responsibility and to face up to it and share it among ourselves in a true community spirit. So to both Senator Dworak and Senator Chambers, Senator Chambers, especially, I think, I find your position on the issue intolerable in that you would say that because this situation did exist in the City of Omaha, because there were deprivations in the City of Omaha, then the people who own property here and henceforth should carry this special sin and obligation. That simply is not true. It is not justifiable to them. It is not justifiable to the children you seek to serve. It is not justifiable to the total community of this state and this country. If we have a problem and we are not going to solve it by retribution and punishment, Senator Dworak or Senator Chambers, we are going to solve it by cooperation and assistance and a mutual desire to reach equitable remedies. For those reasons, I urge you to adopt this amendment, provide this funding and I think it is a question of whether it comes from the fifteen million or the seventeen million is a totally separate question and is the reason I objected to Senator Lewis injecting it. I think that that should be decided separately from the issue of whether or not we are going to, the state is going to assume the obligation for this special and unique situation that has arisen in the City of Omaha and that affects and will affect the quality of education that will be delivered in the City of Omaha. I strongly urge your adoption of this amendment.

PRESIDENT: The question is the adoption of Senator Cavanaugh's amendment to 631. Record your vote. Senator Cavanaugh.
