SENATOR RASMUSSEN: A question of Senator Goodrich, please.

PRESIDENT: Well, he was closing, sir. Is this on the...is this for information purposes to decide how you are going to...

SENATOR RASMUSSEN: Yes.

PRESIDENT: What is it?

SENATOR RASMUSSEN: I would like to ask Senator Goodrich if the killer of the patrolman, if he had a picture on his driver's license, would have prevented...

PRESIDENT: That is argumentative, Senator. That is out of order. The question before us is Senator Goodrich's motion which is to strike the Rasmussen amendment, apparently. Record your vote. Have you voted? Record.

SENATOR GOODRICH: Mr. President, can we have a roll call vote on this thing. This is a very important thing.

PRESIDENT: Call the roll. Call the roll.

CLERK: Roll call vote taken.

PRESIDENT: Senator Anderson. Go ahead.

CLERK: Roll call vote continued. See page 1450, Journal. 26 ayes, 15 nays.

PRESIDENT: What is the report of the vote?

CLERK: 26 ayes, 15 nays.

PRESIDENT: Motion carries.

CLERK: Motion on the desk.

PRESIDENT: Read the motion.

CLERK: I move to indefinitely postpone 781. Signed Senator Rasmussen. It lays over now, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: Yes, that has to lay over.

CLERK: LB 464. Mr. President, the E & R amendments have been adopted. The next amendment is offered by Senator Barnett as follows: To amend the Chambers amendment found in the Journal on Page 783 for the 35th Day by placing a period of line 11 and...by striking the period and putting in place thereof semi-colon and adding, "provided that any municipal corporation may further restrict or prohibit the conducting of lotteries or raffles and gift enterprises or the solicitation of participants or contestants in lotteries or raffles and gift enterprises within the corporate boundaries of such municipality to the extent not otherwise conflicting with state law by ordinance of the governing body." Signed Senator Barnett.
