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causing by voting on it when they think they are just increasing the court, when they think they are just increasing the court to accomodate the workload, the major affect of the bill is to remove the super majority. Now the issue has been discussed on whether the super majority should or should not exist. That is not the issue. The issue is, if you are going to change that constitutional thing, the people should not be deluded into thinking they are doing something else when that is what they are doing and that is what they would be voting on, to increase the Supreme Court. They would be thinking that all they are doing is doing that and they would be doing exactly the opposite. I discussed this with Senator Cavanaugh. He acknowledged the problem. He acknowledged that probably it should be amended, as I recall. I don't see that it can be amended this late. So I don't think you can, in good conscience, allow people to vote for an increased majority when you are changing another major provision of the Constitution.

PRESIDENT: Senator Cavanaugh.

SENATOR CAVANAUGH: I did not acknowledge that it should be amended.

PRESIDENT: Senator Kelly.

SENATOR KELLY: Mr. President and members of the Legislature, I'd refresh your memory that as of now there will be eight constitutional recommendations out of this Legislature for the people to vote on, five from last year and three from this year. 817 will, also, should it pass, make it nine. Included among those will be this Legislature's request from the people to increase the salary of the future legislators. It appears to me that if we want to get a constitutional amendment passed, we had better restrict as many of those constitutional amendments to those that are absolutely necessary and not have ones, like in this case, that I consider frivolous and not needed. That would be my vote against 817 and also my vote for the striking the enacting clause.

PRESIDENT: Senator Mills.

SENATOR MILLS: Senator Kelly, I felt the same way about 666. Thank you.

PRESIDENT: Senator Kime.

SENATOR KIME: Mr. Chairman, what will be the fiscal impact of these two extra judges? Could anyone tell me that?

PRESIDENT: Senator Cavanaugh.

SENATOR CAVANAUGH: There will be no fiscal impact until they are appointed.
