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let the public be heard. However, if as our bill introductions increase, it is physically impossible to have a meaningful public hearing on every bill. So my proposal is to go back to the system we have had previously, that is a ten bill limit on each individual and a ten bill limit on each committee each session.

PRESIDENT: Excuse me, Senator Lamb. (Gavel.) Order in the Chamber, please.

SENATOR LAMB: Thank you, sir. This amendment would go into effect as of the next legislative session. It would not affect what we are doing here today but I think as you will see on this sheet that we are heading toward a situation that is not good and that this is the time to again limit bills. I think those of you who are new in the Legislature I would guess in this last campaign one of the things you heard from your constituents was that there are too many bills introduced in the Legislature. I think that is correct. I think that is what the people are saying and I believe that ten bills will allow you to serve your constituents. When there is no limitation there is a tendency to introduce every bill that every person asks you to introduce. I don't think that is the proper way to go about it. I think you should select those bills which you really feel should be passed. Concentrate on those and with this ten and ten bill limitation I think that goal will be accomplished. I ask you to support this motion.

PRESIDENT: Senator Haberman.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, I campaigned four years ago that too many bills are introduced in the Legislature and everywhere I went the people said that is correct. We like what you are saying. Well I have been down here four years and for the last two years whenever I have made a talk I have said to the members of the Lions Club, Rotary Club, D.A.R., WIFE organization, Chambers of Commerce, I say to them in my talk, you people feel that we offer too many bills, don't you? And they all nod their heads yes. You sure do. You go down there. You throw all these bills in, it is too many. So then I have been saying to these people, all right, let's say, for example, that this D.A.R. group or this WIFE group or this Rotary Club comes to me and says, Senator Haberman, we would like to have you introduce a bill for us. Then I say to them, and have said to them, what do you want me to do, tell you no? And they look at me and they have looked at me and they...well what do you mean? And I said well who is to judge which bills are to be introduced or not to be introduced? Am I the one to tell this body no, I'm not going to introduce
