CLERK: 27 ayes, 0 nays on the motion to withdraw the bill, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: The motion carried. The bill is withdrawn. Are there further messages on my desk or yours, Mr. Clerk?

CLERK: Mr. President, one item. Senator Lamb would like to add his name to LB 533 as co-introducer.

PRESIDENT: Without objection, so ordered.

CLERK: That is all the business that I have, Mr. President.
