going to be heard and if you would like to look at it, I would be glad to show it to you, but I thought to save paper and clutter I would not do it again. But in essence, LB 82 is, therefore, just a technical amendment to 81-108 allowing department heads and their appointees or designated representatives to serve on any state policy-making or advisory board, commission, committee or council, and this, of course, is when appointed by the Governor or other stipulations. Thank you, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: Is there further discussion? The question is, shall LB 182 (sic) advance from General File to E & R for Review? All those in favor vote aye, opposed vote no. The question is on the advancement of LB 82. Have you all voted? Have you all voted? Clerk will record the vote.

CLERK: 28 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on the motion to advance the bill.

PRESIDENT: The motion carries. The bill is advanced.  
LB 83.

CLERK: Mr. President, LB 83 offered by Senators Kilgarin and Nichol. (Read title.) The bill was read on January 6 of this year, referred to the Government Committee. The bill was advanced to General File. I have no amendments to the bill, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes Senator Kilgarin.

SENATOR KILGARIN: Thank you, Mr. President, and colleagues. LB 83, I handed out my testimony at the hearing on this particular piece of legislation. It is...the legislation derives from an interim study the Government, Military and Veterans Affairs Committee did over the interim regarding the Mexican-American Commission and some Attorney General's Opinions.

PRESIDENT: Try to control yourself, Senator.

SENATOR KILGARIN: If Senator Lamb would behave himself I might get through this bill. Anyway we had some interim hearings in the Government, Military and Veterans Affairs Committee talking about some Attorney General's Opinions that had restricted so severely what the Mexican-American Commission could do that it really defied legislative intent. Now if you want to take a brief moment to read through that testimony, I think it very clearly explains both what the interim study proposals were and our findings and it also explains kind of our position and the Mexican-American Commission's position on this bill. I kind of think
