new resolution, LR 28, offered by Senator Wesely. (Read LR 28 as found on page 431 of the Legislative Journal.) That will be laid over, Mr. President. In addition, Senator Hoagland would move to reconsider the body's action in the indefinite postponement of LB 40 yesterday. That, too, will be laid over, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: Both motions laid over. Resolution and motion.

CLERK: Mr. President, with respect to LB 104, it was a bill introduced by Senator Lamb. (Read title.) The bill was read on January 7, referred to the Constitutional Revision and Recreation Committee. The bill was advanced to General File. I have no amendments to the bill.

PRESIDENT: Senator Lamb.

SENATOR LAMB: Mr. President and members, this is a bill that was brought to me by a constituent who had a foreign exchange student from Sweden and when they attempted to get a hunting license for this high school student they found they had to pay the out of state rate and we checked it out with the Game Commission and they said, indeed that was true. They felt badly about it. In fact, Mr. Mahoney felt so badly about it that he sent his personal check to cover the difference between the instate rate and the out of state rate. The purpose really is to let those foreign exchange students have a license on the same basis as college students and other students that come into the state. I move for the advancement of the bill.

PRESIDENT: First the Chair would like to ask for order. (Gavel.) A little quiet in the Chamber. Now we recognize Senator Wagner.

SENATOR WAGNER: Mr. Speaker and members, I rise to support Senator Lamb on his bill, and simply this was an amendment on a bill I had last year and when it was amended it went into consent calendar with an amendment and the bill just didn't get heard. It is long overdue. It is long needed and I certainly support Senator Lamb in his efforts.

PRESIDENT: Senator Labedz.

SENATOR LABEDZ: Thank you, Mr. President. I, too, rise as Chairman of the Constitutional Revision and Recreation Committee to support Senator Howard Lamb. The intent of the bill I believe is to allow the students to live and study in this country as if it was their own home and I think they should be treated as if they were living at home. I support the bill.
