

SENATOR SIECK: The dealer would have to furnish it by the Department of Roads...the Department of Roads would make the sticker just as the original amendment was.

SENATOR CLARK: How handicapped does a person have to be?

SENATOR SIECK: By doctor's orders, they have to be handicapped and get a voucher from the doctor.

SENATOR CLARK: You mean if a person comes in with one leg, they have to have a doctor's order...

SENATOR SIECK: That is right.

SENATOR CLARK: ...to show they are handicapped?

SENATOR SIECK: That is correct. You have to have a voucher for that.

SENATOR CLARK: It is pretty loosely drawn.

PRESIDENT: Are you finished, Senator Clark? Senator Beyer. Have order in the Chamber please. The Chair recognizes Senator Beyer.

SENATOR BEYER: Mr. President and members, a question of Senator Sieck. Senator Sieck, will you yield to a question?

SENATOR SIECK: Senator Beyer.

SENATOR BEYER: The way this is written, what is to stop people from going out of state and buying tires?

SENATOR SIECK: Nothing. You can't stop it. With the original permit, you couldn't stop that.

SENATOR BEYER: I think that was in there but also what are they going to do for tires that they have on hand already?

SENATOR SIECK: Nothing, they will use them. I haven't done anything about that because it is pretty hard to administer. It is almost impossible to administer something like that.

SENATOR BEYER: Well, in the other bill it was in there that they had to have the permit to use them. Here you are saying to buy them in this permit.
