SPEAKER NICHOL: Would this need an A bill with it, Senator Schmit.

SENATOR SCHMIT: I do not believe it needs an A bill.

SPEAKER NICHOL: Where would the money come from then?

SPEAKER NICHOL: Okay, thank you.

PRESIDENT: Is there further discussion? The motion is to advance LB 70. All those in favor vote aye, opposed vote no. Have you all voted? Motion to advance LB 70. The Clerk will record the vote.

CLERK: 25 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on the motion to advance the bill.

PRESIDENT: LB 210. Is there anyone here to handle the bill for Senator Chambers? If not....

SPEAKER NICHOL: I suggest we go to the next one, perhaps he will be back by that time. I suggest he is here now.

PRESIDENT: The Clerk will make reference to LB 210.

CLERK: Mr. President, 210 offered by Senators Chambers and Vickers. (Read title.) The bill was read on January 13, referred to the Retirement Systems Committee. The bill was advanced to General File. I have no amendments to the bill.
