at the concept of continuing education. Many fields have continuing education requirements and so they have spent some time at this among one another and have reached a consensus among the sanitarians that they should have a twelve hour per year continuing education requirement. The sanitarians came to me and asked for the bill. They support it. Those that are inspected by the sanitarians, the Restaurant Association and others support the bill, Hospital Association, and so there is a consensus that the continuing education would be valuable for the state and there is support for the bill. That is what the legislation does. I would ask for your support.

SPEAKER NICHOL: The question is the advancement of LB 542. All those in favor signify by voting aye, opposed nay. Again, may I request some of the senators who are in their offices to please report to the sanctuary so we can continue with the voting. Record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 25 ayes, 0 nays on the motion to advance the bill, Mr. President.

SPEAKER NICHOL: LB 542 is advanced to E & R initial. We will skip LB 24 inasmuch as amendments came in following yesterday, I believe it was, so we will skip that at the moment. LB 75. Would you like to read some things in, Mr. Clerk?

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator Carsten would like to report LB 302 advanced to General File with committee amendments attached. (See pages 575-576 of the Legislative Journal.)

I have a letter from the Governor addressed to the Clerk regarding the signing of LB 60, 66, 143, 144, 177, 182 and 197. They were signed by the Governor on February 17 and delivered to the Secretary of State. (See page 576 of the Journal.)

Mr. President, Senator Lowell Johnson who is vice chair of the Appropriations Committee gives notice of hearing.

Mr. President, LB 75 offered by Senator Schmit. (Read.) The bill was read on January 6, referred to the Constitutional Revision and Recreation Committee, advanced to General File. There are Constitutional amendments pending, Mr. President.
