CLERK: Mr. President, first of all, the Executive Board will be meeting at 10:30 in Room 2102...excuse me, at 10:37 in Room 2102, the Executive Board.

Mr. President, Business and Labor reports 109 indefinitely postponed; LB 217 advanced to General File with committee amendments attached; 432 General File with committee amendments attached; and 524 General File with committee amendments attached. CLERK: Mr. President, LB 126 was last considered yesterday. There was an amendment by Senator Beutler that was adopted, and an amendment by Senator Vard Johnson that was adopted. I now have pending, Mr. President, an amendment by Senator Vickers. SENATOR VICKERS: Mr. President and members, this amendment is partly technical and partly nontechnical, partly has some substantial differences to it. The first part is as read by the Clerk, on line 9, page 3. The current language says, "students who reside in Nebraska", and I believe it is the intention of this piece of legislation to apply only to Nebraska residents, and I think that language is somewhat misleading if you consider that these students may be actually residing in Nebraska even though they may be an out of state student while they go to school. So by changing that language to read, "who are residents of Nebraska", I think is more in line with the intent of the
