SENATOR LABEDZ: Before we go any further, I would like to announce 11 Fourth Graders from Pleasant Dale, Nebraska, guests of Senator Lundy; teacher, Cheryl Lammers, and six parents in the group, in the north balcony. SENATOR WESELY: Thank you. Senator Labeledz, members of the Legislature, Senator Remmers raised some concerns that I think have to be addressed because none of them are existing in this bill. The energy tax credit legislation was already passed last year. It is on the books. It has been in operation. We have found some definitional problems. We are trying to correct those with this bill. But as far as concerns about exemptions and what have you on who pays taxes, there is nothing in this bill that would deal with that whatsoever. We are taking past legislation. We are trying to modify it to deal with some concerns that have been expressed to us. It does not enact any new expanded legislation whatsoever. It just takes previous legislation and makes it more workable. That is what LB 124 does. I ask for your support in it's advancement.

SENATOR LABEDZ: We are voting on LB 124 as amended. Please register your vote. Please vote. Have you all voted?

CLERK: Senator Labeledz voting yes.

SENATOR LABEDZ: Please vote. Have you all voted? Senator Marsh.
