SPEAKER NICHOL: The question is the adoption of the Carsten amendment. All those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 26 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on adoption of Senator Carsten's amendment.

SPEAKER NICHOL: The Carsten amendment is adopted. Senator Warner moves to advance the bill.

SENATOR WARNER: So do, Mr. President.

SPEAKER NICHOL: All those in favor say aye. Opposed nay. It is advanced. There is nothing else on the bill. Senator Warner, do you want to advance it? Senator Warner moves to advance the bill. Oh, I guess we just did. Pardon me. Do you want to read something in?

CLERK: Mr. President, I have an Attorney General's Opinion addressed to Senator Haberman on LB 356. (See pages 2050 and 2051 of the Legislative Journal.) I have some new legislative resolutions. 141 by Senators Chambers and Pappas calls for a study of Nebraska courts and their sentencing of persons convicted of criminal offenses and possible reforms of procedures used. 142 by Senators Chambers and Pappas calls for a study of criminal institutions under the control of the Correctional Services. 143 by Senator Schmit calls for a study to address issues of concern to the citizenry of Nebraska with regard to transportation of people, commodities, raw materials, and manufactured goods via roads, highways, bridges, pipelines, railroads and other means. 144 by Senator Schmit would address issues relating to conservation, utilization, management and development of Nebraska's soil and water resources. 145 by the Business and Labor Committee would call for a study to examine issues involving the determination of employer-employee status under the Nebraska Employment Security Law. 146 by the Business and Labor Committee would call for a study of possible amendments to the Nebraska Employment Security Law in response to recent amendments to the Federal Unemployment Tax Act. 147 by the Business and Labor Committee and signed by its members would call for a review and examination of possible legislation in response to issues raised in LB 567 which proposed requiring larger employers who close or reduce operations to give notice and provide certain employee benefits in order to ease the economic dislocation suffered by affected communities and employees.
