LB 585

SPEAKER NICHOL: Senator R. Johnson, Senator DeCamp has a motion ahead of yours so we will take Senator DeCamp's first. We are on LB 118. Senator DeCamp.

SENATOR DeCAMP: Mr. President, there is no practical way that this or any other significant amendment can be dealt with with 14 to 18 people missing. This is an amendment that on the best day might have 25 votes. It is the one that would restore the numbering system. So I would ask to pass over the amendment and anything that has any problem to it, until we get some people here in the Legislature. Everybody knew we were going to start at 9:00 a.m., it seems they ought to be here.

SPEAKER NICHOL: Senator Rod Johnson and Senator DeCamp have both asked to pass over LB 118 for the moment, which we will do. Senator Vickers, are you ready on LB 585?

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator Vickers would move to return LB 585 to Select File for a specific amendment. The amendment is on page 1841 of the Journal.

SPEAKER NICHOL: Senator Vickers.

SENATOR VICKERS: Mr. President, members, the amendment to LB 585 on page 1841 is technical in nature and 585 as you will recall is a bill that sets up a program to assist those people who are being trained as teachers in the math and science areas and under the bill it talks about a degree that is actually not being awarded in the education in Nebraska as I understand it. So we are attempting to strike Bachelor of Education degree and straighten out the language then in that regard and that is the amendment and I would urge the body's adoption of it.

SPEAKER NICHOL: Any further discussion on LB 585 motion as made by Senator Vickers? The question is shall LB 585 be returned for a specific motion. all those in favor vote aye, opposed vote nay. Have you all voted on the motion to return? Record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 25 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on the motion to return the bill.

SPEAKER NICHOL: The bill is returned. Senator Vickers.

SENATOR VICKERS: Move. . . that was bringing it back, wasn't it. I move the amendment now, Mr. President.
