LB 451

SENATOR LUNDY: Mr. President and members, I would suggest to Senator Lamb and others that it twice is going to double the cost to the cities and towns that are using this and I see no necessity for it at all. One time is sufficient. Seven day notice has been dealt with and I think one publication is sufficient. Thank you.

PRESIDENT: Is there further discussion? Now do you have any closing, Senator Lamb?

SENATOR LAMB: I believe at this point it has been pretty well discussed, Mr. President, and although I thought I was closing before I will waive closing at this time.

PRESIDENT: Very well. We will proceed with the vote on that portion of the Lamb amendment which would propose two times publication instead of one publication. All those in favor vote aye, opposed vote nay. Please record your vote if you wish to vote on the portion of the Lamb amendment that has been explained. The Chair will hold the board open for twenty-five seconds. Please expedite our proceedings. If you wish to vote on the amendment please do so. The Clerk will record the vote.

CLERK: 25 ayes, 11 nays, Mr. President, on adoption of the amendment.

PRESIDENT: That portion of the amendment is adopted. Anything further on the bill?

CLERK: Nothing further on the bill, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: Senator Rod Johnson, are you available?

SENATOR R. JOHNSON: Mr. President, I move we advance LB 451.

PRESIDENT: The motion is to advance LB 451 from Select File to Enrollment and Review for engrossment. All those in favor say aye, opposed no. Motion carried. The bill is advanced. Senator Rod Johnson wanted the Chair to announce, in fact, Senator Rod Johnson, had he had his way, would have liked to have introduced these guests himself because they are special friends of his. They are Lisa Hart Carroll and Betty King who are both starring in the movie, "Terms of Endearment," being filmed here in Lincoln. If they are in the Chamber, Senator Johnson, have them stand and will be recognized. Welcome to the Legislature. Thank you very much. Yes, the Clerk will read matters for the record.
