I think this Legislative Resolution was designed to box all of us in to do something and to do it John's way and no other way. That is the way it is going to be. I'm glad that our Senator from Neligh brought up special interest groups so many times. As I read this Resolution, "Therefore", under Article 1, it says, "It shall be the policy of the individuals voting and supporting this resolution to prevent any increase in taxes from the existing rates for the next fiscal year". This is another one of those tricky little things that only an attorney's mind could come up with it, it is like that "Have you stopped beating your wife"? Answer, yes or no. I guess, if you sign this resolution, if you vote for this resolution then you are saying, I'm not going to support any bills at all this year that have absolutely any fiscal impact. So John is kind of telling you right off the bat that if I get 25 votes for this resolution, that means, no senators' bill that has a thousand dollars or a hundred dollars or a dollar fiscal impact can you vote for, even if it is your own, because that is what the policy is, according to the Resolution written by the Senator from Neligh. Then we talk about special interests. He says, "We can not whip them alone, we have to do it collectively". Again, as I read this statement I think about Commonwealth and the Chairman of the Banking Committee and and I'm on that special investigative committee, you know I still have an open mind.
