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I'm not voting for the special interest people that ask that this thing be put in right now, before we hear the final words on Commonwealth. I think this is just a facade. That if you look deep into this resolution there is more to it than meets the eye and I say that, John, as someone who has been on more diets than you because I have got a few years up on you. Thank you.

PRESIDENT: There are fifteen minutes left on the hour. The Chair recognizes Senator Newell and then Senator Beutler.

SENATOR NEWELL: Mr. President and members of the Legislature, I arise to support the kill motion which I think is the responsible thing to do. I would like to add just a few interesting comments, I hope they will be interesting, comments that I think are of interest are; Is this resolution, should this resolution be before this body? Should it have been referred to committees and try to get some sort of rational process at work here, some way of truly analyzing this whole question of budget and priorities etcetera? I think the answer to that question for most of us is yes, it should have been. That is what our committee system is about, that is what this Legislature is about, and we really ought to follow the process. I think another key issue here is whether or not this proposal has been thought out in great detail and fit so neatly in with what the sponsors of the proposal really are trying to do in this session. I think it would be relatively exciting to look at the introducers of this resolution's bills and find out if they themselves could live with the restraints that are presently placed in this resolution. Are they offering bills with A bills that are going to cost far more than this proposal can be? Now if you get all that, you might find, this is a supposition only, you might find that this resolution, fun as it may be, is not as serious a resolution as it ought to be. I think we need to look at motivations of individuals from time to time. I want to say some things that I think are very important. Senator Johnson to a great extent has stolen some of my thunder, and Senator DeCamp did a very good job of quoting from a report that I put out earlier this year on property taxes. But it is interesting to note that when one looks at the statistics of the State

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
