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amendment and I would ask you to support the amendment and to recognize that fact and to allow us to go forward with this legislation and not to have us reject totally any change in our standards whatsoever at this time.

SPEAKER NICHOL: Senator Pirsch. The question has been called. Do I see five hands? I do. Oh, excuse me, we have another amendment. Sorry about that.

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator Beutler would move to amend the Vickers amendment. (Beutler amendment appears on page 1502 of the Legislative Journal.)

SPEAKER NICHOL: Senator Beutler.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Mr. Speaker, members of the Legislature, this is the only amendment I will offer to this particular version at this point in time and it is essentially one of the same amendments that I offered to the other amendment and that is basically under this version, as under Senator DeCamp and Hoagland's version, these schools are not approved and not accredited which means now they will be handicapped with regard to admission into higher education and maybe prohibited from admission into higher education under rules that are being considered by various institutions. And so this amendment would say that any child educated in a school that elects to come under the provisions of 79-1701 can qualify for admission to the University of Nebraska and the state colleges by testing alone. That is the purpose of the amendment. I would ask for its adoption, Speaker.

SPEAKER NICHOL: May I see the hands of those who wish to speak to the Beutler amendment to the amendment? Okay, Senator Higgins and then Senator Vickers.

SENATOR HIGGINS: Thank you, Mr. President. I think Senator Beutler is exactly right with this amendment because who knows what the future boards of education will do. Maybe these youngsters would go eight years through a Faith Christian School or a Fundamentalist school only to find out that the guidelines to enter high school were such that they
