This is one such response. This response has been effected in twenty-one different jurisdictions, including our sister states. I say, it is a small measure that we would take today. I ask you to support this amendment. It is an important amendment. If you support this amendment, you can literally go home knowing that this session we actually did something for the low income people in our society. It is time.

CLERK: (Read the roll call vote as found on pages 1773-74 of the Legislative Journal.) 25 ayes, 21 nays, Mr. President, on adoption of the amendment.

PRESIDENT: The motion prevails and the amendment is adopted. Anything further on the bill, Mr. Clerk?

CLERK: Nothing further on this bill, Mr. President.
