Mr. President, on 981, we have a series of motions, the first is by Senator Newell. Senator Newell would move to return the bill for specific amendment. Senator Newell's amendment is on page 1953 of the Journal.

SPEAKER NICHOL: Senator Newell.

SENATOR NEWELL: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, my amendment is an attempt to compromise on this issue. Actually what it does is simply this, it strikes the amendment I put on Select File which deals with institutional viability, an eminently fair and rational proposal that had no opposition in the committee. However, like some good proposals, it since gained a great deal of opposition, and then the other part of the amendment would put the agreed to amendments on LB 721 in the bill. The proposal I offer should have general agreement. It may not be the most pleasing compromise I have ever offered, but I think it is an attempt to be reasonable and to make Senator
